HOLIDAYS CLOSE BUILDINGS, ALTER PAYDAY, HURRY DEADLINES, LIMIT LIBRARIES

BUILDINGS CLOSINGS, OPENINGS——Some buildings on campus will be closed, with access limited in others, for the holiday season——5 p.m., Dec. 24 through Jan. 3. This includes the administration building, but representatives from Vice President Gerald Bepko's office will be on call. Other buildings that will close include Bus/SPEA, Mary Cable, the Counseling Center, E/S, E/T, Herron, Lecture Hall, Nursing, and C and D buildings at 38th Street. Thermostats in these buildings will be lowered and mail service will be stopped. Buildings open on a limited basis include Administration at 38th Street, Cavanaugh, Dentistry, Law, PE/Natatorium, Physical Plant, University Library, Coleman, Union—north wing, and Oral Health Research Institute. All others, including hospitals and other essential services, will be open. With the exception of Dec. 25 and Jan. 1, student services such as the bursar, admissions, financial aid and the registrar offices will be open.

PAY- HOLI- BONUS DAYS--Monthly paychecks will be distributed the morning of Jan. 4. Biweekly pay day is Dec. 24. Payroll will be sending out instructions about biweekly time sheets and pay dates. Compensation during the holiday season is determined by many factors, and the person responsible for payroll in your department can assist you with any questions, or call Personnel. Generally, Dec. 25-Jan. 1 will be H or holiday days; all others will be charged to bonus days, accumulated vacations days or paid time off hours for PA classification. Hourly employees receive no compensation during the holiday break.

LIBRARY HOURS--Libraries on IUPUI campuses have special hours for the holidays. Herron will close completely. Others will be open on a limited basis. University Library hours are Dec. 21-23, open 'til 5 p.m.; Dec. 24, open 'til 1 p.m., Dec. 25-27, closed; Dec. 28-31, open 8 a.m.-5 p.m.; Jan. 1-3, closed, and Jan. 4-8, open 8 a.m.-5 p.m.

GRANT PROPOSALS DUE EARLY—If the grant or award you are applying for has a proposal deadline between Dec. 24 and Jan. 4, the deadline for submitting them to Research and Sponsored Programs is Dec. 14—no later because the office will be closed during the holidays and proposals cannot be processed. If you anticipate any problems with that early deadline, call Pam McKeough, 4-8285, "immediately."

UNIVERSITY THEATRE ADDS MATINEE TO "THE BRIDGE"

A Sunday matinee on Dec. 6 at 2:30 p.m. has been added to the production schedule of "The Bridge," an original play by Madge Dishman. Other performances are set for Dec. 11-12 at 8 p.m. Already a winner of the annul national David Library Award for her play "Family Sunrise" that was produced last year at IUPUI, Dishman has entered "The Bridge" for this year's competition. Noted radio and TV personality, Ezra Pound, director of the David Library, will adjudicate the play during the Dec. 11 performance. "The Bridge" is based on an actual group of Appalachian people who lived along the White River where the Medical Center now stands. Several sociological studies have been made of "the famous tribe of Ishmael" or the "Ishmaelites," as they were called. The play tells of Granny's story, revealing her struggle to span the gap between her family's world and modern society's. GOLDEN STATE HIRES HARRIS

Robert Harris, director of the IUPUI Center for Economic Education, is packing his bags and getting ready to move with his wife Bonnie to California, where he has been hired as a two-year consultant to the California Dept. of Education. During his leave of absence from IUPUI, the associate professor of economics will develop a statewide curriculum plan, so that California can comply with a new law that requires one year of economics as a high school graduation requirement. Indiana is not one of half the states that require economics in high school, but Harris believes it eventually will. He said that school-teachers here take economics workshops so that they can teach students—even those in kindergarten—about economics. Also, last year IPS was one of 14 school systems nationwide to be cited for excellence in economic education.—J. Grim

DOCTOR/HISTORIAN HELPS CELEBRATE 40-YEAR PARTNERSHIP

The 40th anniversary of the affiliation between the VA Hospital and the IU Medical Center was celebrated on campus last week and included a special lecture by Dr. Kenneth Ludmerer, author of the book, "Learning to Heal: The Development of American Medical Education," that was hailed in a recent review in The New York Times. Dr. Ludmerer is an associate professor of history and medicine at Washington University at St. Louis. His book reveals that if you were ill in the mid-19th century, there was a good chance your doctor could not read. In the then predominant faculty-owned medical schools, enough money could waive the literacy requirement, and med students who never saw a patient could graduate from a 32-week course and hang out their shingle--if they could find a literate sign painter. While on campus, he lectured on the subject, "American Medical Education: Past, Present and Future," in which he assessed the impact of recent developments in medical practice on medical education, which he said "can have a potentially devastating effect on our system of medical education."--N. Hoffman

SCIENCE SEES HOW YOUR GARDEN GROWS

Research that could affect the design of agricultural products for bigger crop yields is being funded at the School of Science by the National Science Foundation. Charles

Schauf, professor and chairman of the Dept. of Biology, and collaborators William

Stillwell, associate professor of biology, Kathryn J. Wilson, both associate professors of biology, and Stephen Wassall, assistant professor of physics, received the three-year, \$210,000 grant for their work in "Biophysical Studies of Vicia faba (the common bean) Ion Channels." Schauf and his team will use a new research technique, patch-clamping, that examines the movement of ion channels—the microscopic "gates" through which flow chemicals/nutrients from nerve to nerve. The technique allows electrical measurements of cells less than 1/10,000 of an inch in diameter. Schauf is noted for his research on ion channels that is aimed at unlocking the key to multiple sclerosis.—S. Rogers.

ROTC SCHOLARSHIPS GENEROUS


