## SOCIAL WORK DEAN HEADING STATE COMMISSION ON CHILDREN

Dean Sheldon Siegel of the School of Social Work has been putting theories in his chosen field into real-world situations this summer in his role as chair of the Indiana Commission on Abused and Neglected Children and Their Families. Siegel and his 24-member panel have been conducting public hearings and meetings since May to help the state develop a plan of action to deal with problems stemming from the abuse and neglect of Hoosier children. There were 100 deaths of children attributed to abuse and neglect in 1990-91 and nearly 27,000 cases of abuse investigated by child welfare workers in 1990 alone.
