

STUDY SHOWS EXERCISE REDUCES FALLS FOR OLDER ADULTS

Older adults who exercise more fall less, according to a study by Robert Topp, assistant professor of nursing. His study, done in conjunction with the National Institute for Fitness and Sport, focused on whether stronger muscles mean fewer falls and injuries for older adults. It used 70 volunteers and showed that people who worked out improved their overall muscle strength and balance. They also stayed with the exercise regime and had no injuries or other negative results from the workout programs.

DOWNTOWN TOURS TO SUPPORT NURSING SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM



HERRON ART STUDENTS PUT WORKS ON EXHIBIT


