WRAY MEMORIAL LECTURE SET FOR THURSDAY

"Orthoneering Engipedics," or the use of engineering techniques to solve problems in orthopedic surgery and rehabilitation, will be discussed by one of the world's leading authorities on bone and joint surgery this week at the Medical Center.

Dr. Vernon L. Nickel, chief of surgical services and co-director of the Rehabilitation. Engineering Center at Rancho Los Amigos Hospital at the University of Southern California, will deliver the annual James B. Wray Memorial Lecture at 1:30 p.m. Thursday (December 6) and spend three days in conferences and consultations with School of Medicine orthopedic surgeons.

The Wray Lecture, a memorial to the late chairman of orthopedic surgery, will be delivered in Myers Auditorium at Marion County General Hospital. The I.U. orthopedic surgery department is widely recognized as a leader in the uses of engineering techniques in orthopedic surgery and rehabilitation.

Dr. Nickel has published more than 80 articles in medical journals on the treatment of orthopedic problems among the mentally retarded, stroke victims and paralyzed patients.

He is a member of the faculties of medical schools at USC, Loma Linda University, University of California Irvine Campus and Northwestern University. He is also a lecturer and consultant at the United States Naval Hospital at San Diego.

50-VOICE IUPUI CHORALE ON STAGE SUNDAY

The IUPUI Chorale, directed by David W. Greenlee, will present its annual Christmas Concert Sunday (December 9) at 3 p.m. in Lecture Hall 101.

The major work in the concert will be the "Christmas Oratorio" by Saint-Saens. Arranged for organ and strings, the work will feature Charles L. Manning as organist and strings from the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra.

In addition to the 50-voice chorale, five soloists will be featured: Linda Smith, soprano; Sharon Malone, mezzo-soprano; Buffy Sielaff, alto; Richard Kennedy, tenor, and Ronald Phillips, baritone.

The 20-voice Chamber Ensemble will then preform selections from the Oxford Book of Carols, followed by the entire chorale's presentation of lighter works including Bach's "Break Forth O Beauteous Heavenly Light" and "Thou Must Leave Thy Lowly Dwelling" by Berlioz.

The concert is being presented as a free bonus performace in the Showcase of Music Series, sponsored by the I.U. Alumni Association.


