ANTARCTIC ADVENTURER TO SHARE HISTORIC EXPERIENCE

"Take the world's most remote continent, choose the longest and most difficult route across it, select six strangers from six countries speaking several languages, and you have a backdrop to historic achievement—or disaster. On July 27, 1989, a multinational team of explorers set out from Seal Nunataks on the Antarctic Peninsula. Seven months and 3,700 miles later they arrived at the other side of the continent, the first team to traverse Antarctica by dogsled, and the first to trek the length of the Antarctic Peninsula in winter and cross the isolated 'area of inaccessibility' on foot." National Geographic, Nov. 1990

Britisher Geoff Somers, one of the adventurers who made that historic trek, will visit IUPUI Feb. 21 for a presentation called "Crossing a Continent by Dogsled." He will speak at 3 p.m. in room 105 of the Lecture Hall. Sponsored by the IUPUI Humanities Institute, his address is free and open to the public.

Somers, who was responsible for the logistics, navigation and training and driving of one of the three dog teams, calls the continent "the last unspoiled place on Earth."

The \$11-million International Trans-Antarctica Expedition was the dream of Will Steger, a Minnesotan, and Jean-Louis Etienne, a French physician. Other members represented the Soviet Union, China and Japan. The team of six men, three sleds and 40 dogs endured winds of more than 100 mph and temperatures as low as minus 45 degrees. As scientists, they collected measurements of ground and atmospheric ozone, snow samples, meteorologic observations, studies of nutrition and thermoregulation.

Somers, who comes from Keswick, England, also will appear Feb. 21 at the Conference Center as the opening speaker in a three-part seminar series called "Global Connections" co-sponsored by the Division of Continuing Studies and the Humanities Institute. 


PANELISTS TO LOOK AT MEDICAL MALPRACTICE
