Did you know that...

I.U. has asked the 1979 Indiana General Assembly for a 9.2 percent increase in personnel compensation (money to be used for salaries and hiring additional personnel). The Higher Education Commission is recommending a 7 percent hike, while the State Budget Committee recommends 5.29 percent.

TEACHING PROGRAM ENCORE

Last year's Learning Resources Committee Symposium was such a success that another, similar program is on the agenda for <u>Friday, February 23</u>, from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. at the School of Nursing. Faculty in all IUPUI academic units are invited to attend.

HERRON STUDENT WINS CONTEST



A contest to design a <u>logo celebrating the 125th</u> <u>anniversary of the founding of the Young Men's</u> <u>Christian Association of Greater Indianapolis has</u> <u>been won by Douglas David</u>, senior at the Herron School of Art. The announcement was made last week by Donald H. Fortune, vice-president of the YMCA. David's entry was selected from a field of 20 by the Metropolitan YMCA Marketing and Communications Committee.

The artist, a major in visual communications at Herron, previously was first runner-up in the contest to design the state's George Rogers Clark automobile license plate.

Of all the entries, David's was the only one to use a human symbol, and since the YMCA deals in human values the committee thought that his logo was the most appropriate, Fortune said. The logo will be used on all the organization's letterheads and envelopes and will be seen on lapel pins, banners, and other materials used in the year-long celebration.

Loaded Lines -- Because of the increased demands being made on the paging system, the telephone lines often become overloaded.
