IUPUI'S 22ND COMMENCEMENT TO CONFER 3,896 DEGREES

IUPUI Chancellor Gerald L. Bepko will preside and U.S. Senator Richard Lugar will give brief remarks and accept one of seven honorary degrees to be awarded during IUPUI's 22nd commencement May 12 at 3 p.m. in the Hoosier Dome. Lugar also will speak at the School of Law ceremonies later in the day. I.U. President Thomas Ehrlich will confer 3,176 I.U. degrees and Purdue University President Steven C. Beering will confer 720 Purdue degrees. Aurand Harris, internationally acclaimed playwright for youth theatre and former artist-in-residence on this campus, will receive an honorary degree. Others to receive honorary degrees from I.U. are Donald J. Brown, expert economist and professor at Stanford University; David G. Cogan, pioneering ophthalmologist and senior medical officer in the clinical branch of the National Eye Institute; Emily Holmquist, innovator in nursing science and education and first dean of the I.U. School of Nursing, the largest in the nation, and Melvin Simon, real estate developer credited with much of the economic growth in Indianapolis. A Purdue University honorary degree will be bestowed on James Bercaw, extraordinary engineer/researcher who was instrumental in helping set up the CAD/CAM Center on campus. IUPUI students from 18 schools and divisions will be awarded 2,695 undergraduate degrees, 640 graduate school and 561 graduate professional school degrees from dentistry, law and medicine. Deans, trustees, and alumni association leaders from IU and Purdue will join the platform party and help confer degrees. Commencement is open to the public, all are welcome and no tickets are necessary. The Alumni Association handles commencement.

DRUNKOMETER INVENIOR SUBJECT OF FORNEY TALK

The invention and patent of the drunkometer and other life achievements of Rolla Neil Harger, former chairman of the Dept. of Pharmacology and Biochemistry, will be the subject of a talk by Robert B. Forney during a public meeting of the John Shaw Billings History of Medicine Society on May 17 at 4 p.m. in the Emerson Hall auditorium. Forney, distinguished professor emeritus of toxicology, was hired by Harger in 1939 and has been at IU ever since. Harger pioneered legislation to control the use of beverage alcohol by motorists by using the breath test to measure ethanol concentration and "drunkeness." The drunkometer was patented in 1936, nine years after he proposed the test for blood alcohol levels. Harger was born in 1890 in Kansas, retired from the medical center in 1962 and died at the age of 93. For more, call Jans Muller, M.D., 4-8577.

VOLUNTEERS GET LAURELS FOR FOCUS

The more than 200 volunteers involved helped make FOCUS, the first Indiana National College Fair, a "spectacular success," reports Sandy Merritt, coordinator. More than 5,000 students and parents and reps from 150 colleges attended. The office of Carol Nathan, associate dean of the faculties, was very involved in FOCUS, as were others on campus. Merritt, who works in Nathan's office, also coordinates the IUPUI Person-to-Person Academic Fair which in prior years was held on campus in spring, but will be moved to fall--Oct. 8-9--to make way for the state collegiate fair, which is expected to become an annual event.
