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PDP: A BIG PLUS FOR IUPUI

A Project Development Program -- in the planning stages for more than one year -- has been unveiled at IUPUI. A fund of \$175,000 has been made available to schools and units for faculty projects -- research projects, teaching projects, service projects -- whatever is deemed most appropriate.

"This is an <u>exciting</u> program for Indianapolis," said Dr. Wendell F. McBurney, dean of Research and Sponsored Programs, whose office will administer the program.

"This is <u>new money</u> for faculty projects," he emphasized. "We should be on line with allocations to schools by the end of the semester. And we intend this to be a permanent program with annual allocations," he added.

"At this very moment, deans and directors and their faculties and staffs are drawing up one-page (we hope) plans which will define how the allocated funds will be distributed within each school," McBurney reported.

Funded by the I.U. Foundation, the University Research Operations Committee and, this year, by the participating units themselves, the PDP will provide funds to help faculty develop and maintain externally funded projects.

Eighty percent of all funds available in a given fiscal year will be allocated directly to schools reporting to the I.U. Vice President, Indianapolis. Of that amount, each school will receive an allocation based on its share of the total IUPUI external income generated by proposals processed through Research and Sponsored Programs during the preceding fiscal year.

The other 20 percent will be allocated to Research and Sponsored Programs to help schools with newly developing external support programs with expenses related to new projects and the generation of more external support.

"We really intend for this program to encourage flexibility," said McBurney. "We have provided some general guidelines, but there is ample provision for each school or unit to develop its own method of internal allocations. Incidentally, this program covers not only schools, but also similar administrative units like the Columbus Center, Student Services and the IUPUI Libraries.

"All the planning and projecting for this program was done by a 17-member committee over the last year. We had representatives from all the schools and divisions, appointed by their deans or directors," McBurney explained. "Then last spring Vice President Irwin appointed an eight-member advisory committee which is chaired by Dr. Jack Hart from the School of Engineering and Technology."

Other members of the committee are Dr. David Bixler, School of Dentistry; Magdalene Fuller, School of Nursing; Dr. George Hettenhouse, School of Business; Dr. John Kremer, School of Science; Robert Bonner, IUPUI Libraries; Dr. Suzanne Knoebel, School of Medicine; Dr. Gerald T. Powers, School of Social Work, and McBurney (ex officio).

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IUPUI -- 21,453-STRONG

With a total fall semester enrollment of 21,453 students, IUPUI recorded the highest numerical and percentage increase in the eight-campus I.U. system. The figures represent an increase of 946 students over last fall's enrollment, up 4.61 percent.

The enrollment figures for the entire system showed an I.U. enrollment of 76,394, an increase of 1,244 students, or 1.66 percent. Increases were reported at Bloomington, Kokomo, South Bend, Richmond and New Albany, as well as Indianapolis.

President John W. Ryan said, "I.U.'s enrollment is in step with predictions made by the federal government's National Center for Education Statistics which expects enrollments nationwide will increase one percent."

The new figures show women continue to outnumber men at I.U. with 39,957 females attending classes, compared to 36,437 men. It also was reported that I.U.'s freshman class has 676 more students than last fall. The number of credit hours students are taking also has increased. Total hours for credit in which students are enrolled is 769,376, which is 9,734 (1.28 percent) more than last year.

While enrollment declines were reported on two campuses -- Fort Wayne and Gary -- overall the university continues to be the state's largest system of higher education.


