Radiation Oncology earns accreditation

Radiation Oncology Services at Indiana University Hospital/Clarian Health Radiation Oncology have been awarded a three-year accreditation following a recent survey by the American College of Radiology (ACR).

The ACR awards accreditation to facilities for the achievement of high practice standards after a peer-review evaluation. Evaluations are conducted by board-certified physicians and medical physicists who are experts in the field. They assess the qualifications of the personnel and the adequacy of the facility equipment. The surveyors report their findings to the ACR's Committee on Accreditation, which subsequently provides the practice with a comprehensive report.

The ACR is a national organization serving more than 32,000 diagnostic and interventional radiologists, radiation oncologists, and nuclear medicine and medical physicists with programs focusing on the practice of medical imaging and radiation oncology and the delivery of comprehensive health care services.

An update from Indiana Clinic CEO John F. Fitzgerald

In March, I announced that we had 412 physicians and approximately 1,000 staff in the Indiana Clinic. I am pleased to share that we are gearing up to bring the following groups into the Indiana Clinic in the June - August timeframe and will report those final numbers once physicians and staff have joined. They include:

- IU Family Medicine
- IU Hospitalists
- IU Department of Medicine:
 - o Cardiology
 - o Endocrinology
 - o Rheumatology
 - o Pulmonology
 - o Nephrology
 - o Hematology/Oncology
 - o Gastroenterology
 - o Infectious Disease
 - o Allergy
 - o Clinical Pharmacology

In addition to bringing physicians and their staff into the Indiana Clinic, we are also focusing on key areas to provide preeminent patient care, education, and research. In March, I shared what we are doing in education. Now, I would like to describe for you what we are doing in research.

We have formed a Research Committee, chaired by Dr. Anantha Shekhar, director of the Indiana Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute (CTSI). It consists of 20 physicians from across the Indianapolis Clarian Health system, including liaisons from the Indiana Clinic Board of Trustees (Sam Odle, Dr. David Crabb and Dr. Larry Stevens). The purpose of this subcommittee is to recommend a

comprehensive approach to the organization and administration of research within the Indiana Clinic. We hope to develop an integrated clinical research network that will assist investigators at all entities of our system (i.e., IU, Methodist, and Riley hospitals) in the recruitment of clinical trial volunteers.

Several aspects of the clinical trial recruitment process represent major challenges to effective clinical and translational research. First, is the problem of finding the "right" patient who must meet all inclusion criteria appropriate for the study, but without any exclusion factors that would render him or her ineligible for study. Next, since patient privacy regulations appropriately limit access to patients' medical records, most patient recruitment results from a physician referral. And finally, once a trial is proposed, this recruitment must occur rapidly, or the investigator risks falling behind or even losing the contract. In addition, all trial processes (including recruitment) must pass stringent examination by an Institutional Review Board (IRB) to demonstrate ethical and legal compliance. Also at any given time, numerous ongoing clinical trials require that recruitment be coordinated, so trials do not compete for the same patients.

The Research Subcommittee is beginning to address these challenges by gathering data about all clinical research being done at various entities across our system and what needs exist to improve recruitment effectiveness. For instance, we are considering establishing a centrally managed team of coordinators who will facilitate patient recruitment. We are also proposing a more visible role for the CTSI in assisting our research entities with training, funding and review.

Our goal is to bring existing research efforts into alignment and to increase the growth of clinical trial activity. The practical importance and relevance of research cannot be underestimated: progress in medicine relies on research to advance our understanding of diseases, perfect therapies, and thus improve health and enrich the quality of life for countless individuals and families. As such, research is central to the mission and goals of the Indiana Clinic.

This Week on Sound Medicine

This weekend, June 5 and 6, *Sound Medicine* host Barbara Lewis and guests will discuss the potential of cancer vaccines, prophylactic mastectomies, the benefits of Avastin and a research database for psychiatric disease.

Doug Schwartzentruber, MD, medical director of the Goshen Center for Cancer Care in Goshen, Indiana, was named to the *2010 TIME 100* for his work in developing a vaccine for melanoma. He will discuss his study - one of the first to find that vaccines may be effective against some types

of cancer. The melanoma vaccine, combined with an existing treatment, greatly increased tumor shrinkage and helped keep the cancer from spreading.

It's not uncommon for women who've had cancer in one breast to give serious consideration to removing the other one as a preventive measure. Does this make sense, both from a medical standpoint as well as psychologically? Co-host and IU breast cancer specialist Kathy Miller, MD, will talk about the most recent study that shows that removing the healthy breast does benefit one select group of women.

Also focusing on breast cancer, co-host and pharmacogeneticist David Flockhart, MD, talks to his colleague Bryan Schneider, MD, a medical oncologist at the IU Simon Cancer Center, who wants to determine which breast cancer patients will benefit from the drug Avastin.

Sound Medicine commentator Aaron Carroll, MD, provides a point-by-point walk through of the elements of health care reform that are taking effect in 2010. A patient's bill of rights will be released soon. What's likely to be in it? In describing the bill of rights, President Obama said it would set up an appeals process to enforce rights. How might that work?

Maree Webster, MD, who supervises the Stanley Medical Research Institute at Johns Hopkins University, talks about their brain bank and how it helps researchers find answers to difficult diseases including schizophrenia, bipolar disorder and major depression. Researchers can access the database for free and request tissue samples without cost.
