DR. GROSFELD TO DIRECT PEDIATRIC SURGERY

A major academic appointment for the School of Medicine -- Dr. Jay L. Grosfeld as director of pediatric surgery -- has been approved by the I.U. board of trustees.

Dr. Grosfeld is leaving the New York University School of Medicine, where he has been director of the division of pediatric surgery, to direct the development of education, patient care, and research programs in pediatric surgery for both the I.U. School of Medicine and Riley Hospital for Children.

Dr. Glenn W. Irwin Jr., dean of the medical school, said substantial increases in the school's enrollment and the increasing importance of Riley Hospital throughout Indiana and the Midwest require extensive developments in pediatric surgery.

Dr. Grosfeld, a native of New York City, has established a national reputation in pediatric surgery and research. He is a cum laude graduate of New York University's Washington Square College who received his medical degree in 1961 from the NYU medical school.

He completed his internship at New York's Bellevue Hospital, a residency in surgery at the New York University Hospitals, and then served in the United States Army as assistant chief of general surgery at Fort Jackson, South Carolina. After his discharge from duty in 1968, Dr. Grosfeld took a fellowship and advanced residency in pediatric surgery at Children's Hospital in Columbus, Ohio. He returned to NYU in 1970 as assistant professor of surgery and director of pediatric surgery.

Dr. Joseph M. Black, for 20 years a practicing physician in Seymour and national president in 1965-66 of the I.U. Alumni Association, has been named by alumni of the university to a three-year term on the board of trustees.

He will succeed Robert H. Menke of Huntingburg, a member of the board for six years, who chose not to seek re-election. Menke's term expires July 1.

Three members of the board are chosen by alumni--one board member each year--and the other five are appointed by the governor and state superintendent of public instruction.

Dr. Black received 5,620 alumni votes. A total of 22,806 votes was cast.

Dr. Black, who received the A.B. degree from I.U. in 1941 and the M.D. degree in 1944, was president of the Indiana State Medical Association in 1964-65, and currently is chairman of the board of Indiana Blue Shield.

Two attorneys, a physician, a business executive, and an educator have been elected to the Executive Council of the I.U. Alumni Association.

Chosen from among 10 candidates for five positions on the Council were: John F. Beckman Jr., Hammond attorney; Dr. Gail E. Eldridge, Indianapolis physician; Eugene J. McGarvey Jr., Kokomo attorney; J. Michael Perry, registered representative for City Securities Corp., Indianapolis, and Miss Ethel C. Smith, professor of music at Indiana State University.

## MONEY AND DRUG NEWS

Although foundations, corporations, churches, and other institutions declined in their financial support for higher education last year, private gifts increased; this reversed the downward trend of the previous year. The council for Financial Aid to Education, which released the relevant statistics, says that the gain in private contributions broke all previous records and was enough to cover the losses in institutional support. One interesting fact: gifts to public institutions are growing at a faster rate than gifts to private colleges and universities. . .

Researchers at the University of Michigan Survey Research Center have conducted a nation-wide study of drug use among young people. A few of their findings: the use of drugs is higher among unemployed youth and on army bases than on college campuses; the number of those who have tried marijuana at least once is no greater than the number of those who regularly use alcohol; a large majority of young people disapprove of all illegal drugs, with the exception of marijuana; and half of the young people sampled do not approve of experimentation with marijuana.
