THINK AFFIRMATIVE

A conference sponsored by the IUPUI Affirmative Action Office designed for IUPUI management personnel and unit representatives on the Affirmative Action Advisory Council will be held on three days this month and next in the School of Nursing.

Open and free to all interested persons who wish to attend, the sessions will meet Thursday (Feb. 27) from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and March 13 and March 27 from 1:30 p.m. to 5 p.m.

On Thursday's program, morning topics will cover laws and regulations governing institutions of higher learning, a legal debate on issues of "preferential treatment" and "reverse discrimination," plus discussion of ramifications of Title IX, Higher Education Act of 1972.

Afternoon workshops Thursday will be given in two sections for non-instructional and instructional personnel. Both workshops will be repeated. The subject will be "Recruitment and Hiring for Part- and Full-Time Personnel" and will include types of discrimination in employment, designing and evaluating old and new positions, sources for recruitment, and determination and achievement of goals.

The second workshop on March 13 will cover "In-Training Programs and Promotional Techniques." Workshop A for non-instructional personnel will include discussion of clerical dilemmas, locked-in positions, movement to middle and top management and initial appointments.

Workshop B for instructional personnel will explore academic offerings, non-degree programs, special use of part-time instructional staff and using instructional media of IHETS and educational television.

The final workshop of the series on March 27 covers personnel policies and fringe benefits. Workshop A (non-instructional personnel) will review policies in recruiting and receiving applicants, interviews, testing programs, retirement and pension plans, job descriptions, maternity and leave policies and regulations governing employment of the handicapped and the aged.

Workshop B (instructional personnel) will be directed to policies for sabbaticals, promotions and tenure, insurance and pension programs, assignments to policy-making committees, special events and administrative appointments.

Workshops will be conducted by officials from the Indiana Civil Rights Commission, Equal Employment Opportunity Office, IUPUI law professors and affirmative action officers.

Anyone wishing to attend should register with the Affirmative Action Office in the Administration Building. Pre-paid reservations for an optional luncheon on Thursday (Feb. 27) are required at \$3.50 each. There is no fee for attendance at lectures or workshops.
