IUPUI Express runs up deficit, rider fare to increase Jan. 1

The IUPUI Express. originally an experimental bus service for lunch-time transportation between the Michigan Street campus and downtown, may no longer shuttle for 10 cents a ride as of Jan. 1, 1981.

According to John N. Gobis, Metro marketing manager, organizations which previously provided subsidies to the project have not expressed interest in continuing their support. IUPUI is not one of them.

In a letter from Dr. Glenn W. Irwin, Jr., vice president, Indiana University (Indianapolis), to Gobis, Irwin wrote, "The Indinapolis campus is prepared to continue its participation in a partnership capacity.

Other organizations included in that partnership were the

IUPUI - Downtown

Indianapolis Department of Metropolitan Development, Marion County Health and Hospital Corp. and the Health and Hospital Corp.

Neil Lantz, director of IUPUI administrative affairs, said the problem is economics. "The Express runs a deficit of more than \$60,000 a year. The question is how far should anyone go to pay for someone else's transportation.'

Although negotiations among supporters have not ended, one fact is certain—the fare will

Robert M. Tirmenstein, director of Parking Services at IUPUI and negotiator for the campus, said, "Costs are increasing. I think students realize that 10 cents is unreasonable today. If Metro assumes [complete] responsibility of the service, the price will be a standard 50-cent charge. However, it is still possible to have the Express at 25 cents per

According to a letter from Gobis to Bob Baxter, assistant to the vice president, if Metro does take over the IUPUI Express, the service will take "a completely new identity as a Metro Shuttle." Possible "rerouting and rescheduling of the service to other areas of the central business district" will be

SA legislation proposes student phone directory

Facilitating student communication and making money which is less restricted than activity fee revenues are the reasons for a Student Assembly (SA) project currently under consideration by the senate, reveals SA President Paul Ragan.

The project is a student telephone directory to be produced by a local production company, at "no cost to the Student Assembly, the University or the student body," according to SA Bill No. 19, now before the programs committee for review.

The bill further stipulates
"that in return for sponsoring
the telephone directory, the
Student Assembly would
receive 100 percent of the profit
from this production. The profit
would consist of total
advertising sales minus
typesetting, printing,
production and advertising commissions."

According to Ragan, chief advocate of the project, revenue from directory advertising could help to fund SA programs such as a student retreat, bulletin boards or an off-campus party open to the IUPUI community.

All projects would have to meet with the approval of the senate, but they wouldn't necessarily have to meet the guidelines attached to projects funded by activity fee revenues, adds Ragan. The president estimates that the SA could net at least \$1,000. Its participation in the project amounts to sponsorship ad distribution.

The project is expected to cost \$6,500 to produce. About Face Productions, Inc., 2804 E. 55 Place, the company under



consideration for the job, will sell advertising to cover production costs. It will also receive 20 percent commission from the advertising revenue. The SA will receive the remaining income.

Describing the directory as a "good service" for the student body, Ragan explains the publication would be distributed free of charge. Students who restrain their name and phone number from publication would have to purchase a copy (if they wanted one.)

According to the IUPUI Student Rights and Responsibilities Handbook, "public information," such as name, address and telephone number, shall be released freely "unless the student secures the appropriate form requesting that the information not be released."

Forms to restrain the information can be had in the Registrar's Office, Cavanaugh Hall, Room 301.

If the SA approves the project, the bill provides for a reasonable amount of time to restrain the information.

Dr. Golan Mannan, dean for

student services, remarks that "a good amount of time is needed—at least a month" to allow students to restrain the information from publication.

Mannan expresses a concern that if the project is rushed and the restraining time is not reasonable, law suits could follow.

The dean also expresses the concern that if the computer tape to be provided to the production company contains addresses, the "junk" mailing houses, insurance companies and the like would be eager to purchase the tape. "I hope that doesn't happen," says Mannan.

Ragan imagines addresses will be included in the directory, thus eliminating the worry that the production company would market the listing for its own gain.


"Junk mail never hurt anyone; if you don't want it, just throw it away," concludes Ragan.

In any case, Mannan "hopes to see the contract before the SA goes anywhere [with the project]." He adds, "Advertisements should not be sold in the name of IUPUI or the Student Assembly" since the project was initiated completely outside of the university.

Ragan recognizes that
Mannan "has final authority on
the contract" and assures "my
attorney, Frank Brinkman, will
be acting in the best interests of
the students."

Attorney Frank Brinkman, recent graduate of the IU School of Law-Indianapolis, is a former SA president.

Mike Reardon, representing About Face Productions in the proposed endeavor, is also a former SA president.

Interested in women's intramurals?

According to David Craig, Student Assembly senator, and Jeff Vessely, director of intramural sports, these are questions currently being addressed by the SA and the School of Physical Education.

Vessely says his office has tried to comply with female intramural requests in the past. He cites examples of his efforts, such as scheduling informal luncheon meetings and sending out fliers and representatives to stimulate interest, but response to these efforts was not great.

Vessely and Craig both agree there is a need to let the women express their interest again, so the Intramural Department is providing free court time for one day, Monday, Dec. 8, from 6-8 p.m. at the School of Physical Education, 1010 W. 64th St.

Vessely is urging all interested women to show, prepared to shoot around and play sometime ketball. A meeting will be held afterwards to discuss the possibility of forming a league.

"We're trying to put the burden back on the women," states Vessely. "If nobody shows up, there's not a whole lot we can do. This is the best chance to get us moving," he

SA senators Craig, Jeff Aldridge and Mimi Pruitt have formed a committee to promote the event.

Vessely notes that basketball need not be the only sport considered at the meeting. His office is willing to try to put together a program for any activity the women will support.

"I'm convinced that one week from now no one will be able to say we didn't do anything," Vessely stresses.

IUPUI Metros over .500, sweep first three games

After winning their first three games, the IUPUI Metros are 3-2 as of a Thanksgiving eve defeat to Hanover.

Following their victorious opener against Goshen, Coach Mel Garland's cagers downed Oakland City, 74-69, Nov. 19 at Market Square Arena. Though the Oaks scored the first basket, the IUPUIers evened the score and put a strangle-hold on the lead for the duration of the game.

Running up their widest margin, 48-35, early in the second half, the Metros saw the gap close to 67-65 with only 57 seconds remaining. Nevertheless, the poise of Randy Wilkes and Kim King at the free-throw line kept the Metros' hopes alive and the lead intact. Wilkes sank a total of three charity shots, and King shot four in a row in the closing seconds to clinch the win.

The Oaks' Brett Ayer took game scoring honors with 20 points, while Mike Herr's 16 points and seven rebounds paced the Metros. King drilled 14, going 8-9 at the stripe. Reggie Butler chipped in 11.

Next, the Metros claimed second-place in the Cedarville Tournament. On Friday, Nov. 21, the IUPUI squad conquered Kenyon College 54-50, behind Ron Angevine's 19-point effort. King also hit in double figures with 10, while Kevin Brauns grabbed eight of his teams 36 rebounds.

In the championahip game Saturday, Nov. 22, host Cedarville handed the Metro squad their first less of the season in a 51-50 heartbreaker. Cedarville, who earned their way into the final game with a win over IU-PU-Fort Wayne, built up a 14-point bulge by halftime. However, Haywood Garrett came alive in the second half to rally the Metros to within one. Garrett scored 10 and hauled down 13 rebounds in the surge.

Four other Metros finished in twin figures on the night.
Angevine capped off the tournament with 18 points; Herr scored 14; King hit for 11, and Butler dropped in 10. Both Herr and Angevine were named to the all-tournament team.

On Thanksgiving eve, the Metro squad dropped their second straight—this one to the Hanover Panthers, 71-68. With Garland's crew up by one at the break, 35-34, the Panthers came back to knot it at 40. The Metros managed to regain the upper hand, running the edge up to 54-49 on a Joe Leonard three-point play.

Then the IUPUIers went into a tailspin, committing three successive turnovers. Hanover converted on all of them, turning a five-point Metro lead into a one-point deficit.

The Metros stayed within striking distance and tried to play catch-up, but a missed shot, another error and missed free throws negated all their chances. The final IUPUI bucket of the game came on Wilkes' 35-footer as time ran out.

Once again, Angevine was the top point producer for the IUPUI Metros with 16. Herr canned 12, and Wilkes popped for 10. Butler snared eight rebounds, Herr, seven, and Haywood Garrett, six.

Statistically this season, Angevine is the leading scorer, carrying a 13.4 ppg average. Herr follows with 11.7 ppg and is a perfect 10-10 from the freethrow line. King is 15-17 from the stripe and has a 10.4 point average.

In the rebounding category, Butler tops the list with 32. Garrett has 30, and Herr has 23. So far, Herr leads in assists handing out 15.

Next, the Metros turn their attention to the Carson-Newman Tournament in Nashville Friday-Saturday, Dec. 5-6. The team returns home Dec. 10, hosting IU-Southeast at Market Square Arena (4:45 p.m.). That same Wednesday night, the Indiana Pacers take on the Western Division leaders, the Phoenix Suns.







Fish economical nutrient

Fish is nature's most nearly perfect food. High in protein, vitamins and minerals and low in calories and cholesterol, fish combines nutritional and economic value with versatility and ease of preparation together in one food. Today, there are some 250 forms in which fish is marketed.

If you've ever discovered dieting, you've more than likely found yourself eating fish. Lean fish, such as bass, clams, crabs, grouper, haddock, halibut, perch, pike, shrimp, snapper or tuna canned in water, contain less than 2 percent fat.

Those higher in fat, such as herring, mackerel, mullet, salmon, sardines, swordfish, trout and tuna canned in oil, contain from 6 percent to 20 percent fat. For those on low-sodium diets, fin fish, oysters and crabs are practically sodium-

Nutritionally, fish rates right up there with meat, milk and eggs, when it comes to top-quality protein. Niacin, thiamin and riboflavin are among the many nutrients found in fin fish. Also found in generous amount are minerals-iodine, calcium, phosphorus, iron, potassium and copper, and since fish contains none of the coarse fibrous membranes found in many animal meats, it is easily digested.

Economically, fish is one of the most inexpensive forms of food protein. A whole fish is 45 percent edible, a drawn fish, 48 percent, while a dressed fish is 67 percent edible. Fish steaks and fillets are 86 percent and 100 percent edible,

respectively. Fresh fish is marketed in several forms. Whole or round is pretty much what it implies—fish as is. Drawn fish have had the entrails removed. A dressed fish has been relieved of its entrails,

A split fish is a dressed fish with its backbone removed. Steaks are dressed fish, cut crosswise; fillets are cut lengthwise, and two fillets are put together to achieve a butterfly fillet cut.

When shopping for fish, look for these signs: • The flesh should have a bounce to it. After pressing the skin, it should come back to its natural shape.

• If the fish smells fishy, don't buy it. Fish

spoils relatively quickly.

• Steaks and fillets should be fresh cut with no traces of brown around the edges.

Store-bought fresh fish should not be frozen; it should be kept in the refrigerator for no longer than two days. A fresh fish tastes best the moment it comes from the water.

For fine fish cookery, never mind the clock; test a fish for doneness with a fork. Probe the fish where the flesh is thickest. When the flesh flakes easily at the touch of tines, the fish is done and should be served immediately.

Shrimp broiled in olive oil with lemon juice and garlic (Scampi)

1 lb. raw shrimp, peeled 2 T. lemon juice 1/4 C. olive oil 1 clove garlic 1/2 t. salt 1/8 t. pepper

2 T. fresh parsley, chopped Combine lemon juice, olive oil, mined garlic, salt and pepper in a bowl and stir. Add shrimp and stir gently until all are completely coated.

Arrange shrimp in a single layer in bottom of preheated boiler pan. Pour over them any oil mixture remaining and broil about five minutes from source of heat. Broil, turning once, for five to eight minutes or until shrimp are done. Stir in
