

SORONO SYMPOSIUM SPONSORED HERE

Some of the top physiologists from around the world were in Indianapolis last week for a three-day symposium co-sponsored by the Department of Physiology of the I.U. School of Medicine and Serson Symposia of Rome, Italy.

Subject of the symposium was "Catecholamines as Hormone Regulators." While the discussion involved reports of the latest basic research, the findings will have important implications for the treatment of disorders such as Parkinson's Disease or various neurological maladies, according to Dr. Nira Ben-Jonathan, associate professor of medicine at the I.U. School of Medicine and Graduate School, who was the scientific secretary for the meeting. The program opened Monday morning with a welcoming address by Dr. Walter J. Daly, medical school dean. A total of 22 papers were presented and discussed from that time until noon Wednesday. The group had been working for two years on the program.

Serson Symposia was created as an independent foundation in 1971 by Serson, an Italian pharmaceutical company, to promote scientific research in all disciplines which make valid contributions to human health and welfare. Eight or 10 congresses, courses, seminars, or specialized studies have been held each year, mostly in European countries. This is only the third one held in the United States. Official language of the Symposia is English. Proceedings are published in handsome volumes and distributed world-wide to the scientific community. No form of advertising or promotional activity by any pharmaceutical company is allowed at the congresses.

"SIX SATURDAYS IN SCIENCE" SCHEDULED

A program focusing on the development of critical and intuitive thinking in bright young minds through creative science projects begins this fall at the Purdue University School of Science at IUPUI. Four of the school's disciplines--biology, chemistry, psychology and physics--are joining in this initial effort to stimulate talented high school sophomores to explore the unknown during the six Saturdays, Oct. 15 through Nov. 19, on the 38th Street Campus.

A total of 80 students (20 per department) will gain hands-on experience in using sophisticated instruments in many research projects and interpreting and applying the resulting data to their educational experiences. Cost is \$60 for the entire program. If the 9 a.m. to noon program is successful, other departments, including geology, are expected to participate in the spring.

HEADSTART MOTHERS OPPOSE BUSING

A recent I.U. study of the attitudes of 100 Indianapolis Headstart Center mothers toward school desegregation shows that while a vast majority equate suburban schools with quality education, they oppose court-ordered school desegregation and see busing as a racial issue rather than as an access to that education. The study was conducted by Jacqueline Blackwell, assistant professor at the I.U. School of Education at IUPUI and at Bloomington. It is one of the research projects

of the Center for Urban and Multicultural Education (CUME) at both campuses and was supported principally by a research incentive grant from the School of Education. Rochelle Cohen, education coordinator of Indianapolis Headstart, acted as project facilitator.

Among the recommendations was one stating that human relations programs of desegregated schools should be reorganized to insure that no parent or student compelled to participate in involuntary busing be left without a clear understanding of why the court deemed such a sacrifice necessary. Plans also should be made for an outreach program to pre-schoolers such as those in Headstart and day care programs. (This agreed with findings in an earlier study by CUME.)

WORKSHOP ON EMPLOYING FOREIGN NATIONALS

Indiana University annually appoints over 200 foreign nationals to full-time teaching and research positions that are either temporary or permanent. Some problems have been encountered by the hiring schools or departments in obtaining the necessary Alien Employment Certification.

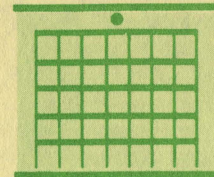
