

Campus Safety

FIRST SEVEN YELLOW EMERGENCY PHONES READY AND WORKING ON CAMPUS

IUPUI police hope faculty, staff and students will notice and use, when necessary, the seven **Emergency Call Phones** located in bright yellow boxes in or near parking areas on campus. You need only to open the door of the phone box, lift the headset and you will be automatically connected to the dispatcher in the campus police department. Police will know where you are on campus because the number of the phone you use will be displayed in the police department. "We hope everyone on campus will notice where the emergency phones are so that they will know how to get help immediately if they need it," said Larry Propst, deputy chief of the IUPUI police. Following are the locations and the parking lot or areas served by the phones in the yellow weatherproof boxes marked "emergency." (Others will be added in the near future--see below.)

Lot 1--	Institute of Psychiatric Research, northeast corner of the building.
Lot 58--	North side of New York Street, mounted on pedestal in the southeast corner of the lot.
Lot 59--	North side of New York St., mounted on pedestal in the southeast corner of the lot.
Lots 72, 73, 92--	Mary Cable Building, north side of the building.
Lots 69, 70, 71--	East Parking Garage, north side of building, mounted on a pedestal at the southwest corner of the intersection of Douglas and North Sts.
Lot 8--	Power Plant Building, east side of the building (southeast corner).
Lot 75--	Bowers Building, mounted on the east side of the building near the entrance to the Police Department.

More emergency phones will be added in the second phase of the project and will include installations at Herron and the 38th St. campuses. Equipment is due soon and by summer session, phones are expected to be installed at Herron on the Fesler and Museum Buildings. Also, at 38th Street, an existing phone will be made into an emergency phone and will be moved to lot level, just south of AD, and two others will be installed on the south side and west end of the Krannert Building. In the third phase, other phones will be added in parking garage areas on the downtown campus. The emergency phone project was undertaken by a subcommittee of the IUPUI Public Safety Committee, with funding provided by Parking Services, Telecommunications and the Police Department.

CALL 4-7971 FOR CAMPUS POLICE ESCORT VAN The IUPUI police department continues to operate an escort service on campus between the hours of 6 p.m. and 2 a.m. daily. Anyone who needs an escort at other times can call police and arrangements can be made. During inclement weather or other heavy use times, it may take extra time for the van to reach you; therefore, it is suggested that you call for the escort a few minutes ahead of the time you need it. Police ask that you be patient in waiting for the van or a police officer. Students, faculty and staff are urged to use the service. Call 4-7971.

MUSIC BRINGS RUSSIAN OPERA SINGERS TO US APRIL 18

The IU School of Music and the Moscow State Conservatory will present excerpts from two operas in a free mini-concert on this campus April 18, beginning at 2:30 p.m. in LE 101. The concert is in conjunction with the performances by the IU Opera Theater and the Russian singers of "Francesca da Rimini" and "The Cry of Clytaemnestra" in Bloomington Apr. 7, 14 and 21. Smurl also is a member of the project, the American Academy of Religion and an associate of the Hastings Institute of Society, Ethics and Life Sciences. He wrote A Primer in Ethics and Religious Ethics.


