NEW DRUG REGIMEN REPORTED EFFECTIVE AGAINST CANCER TYPE

Another step toward the conquest of cancer was announced this weekend by Dr. Lawrence Einhorn, chief of the chemotherapy section of the Department of Medicine at the Indiana University School of Medicine.

Dr. Einhorn reported success with a new drug regimen for testicular cancer, which usually attacks men in their 20's and 30's. This type of cancer accounts for only one per cent of the total cancer cases in the United States. It is virulent and fast-spreading, migrating directly to the lungs, making it difficult or impossible to eradicate by surgery in many cases.

The report was made at a postgraduate seminar co-sponsored by the I.U. School of Medicine and the North Central Section of the American Urological Association at the Indianapolis Convention-Exposition Center. About 700 urologists from throughout the United States and Canada attended the meetings.

Dr. Einhorn will make a more detailed report at a cancer meeting scheduled in May at Toronto, Canada. He made his report to the urology meeting because testicular cancer, while comparatively rare, is the type commonly seen by urologists.

With a regimen of a combination of three drugs, Platinum, Velban, and Bleomycin, Dr. Einhorn reported that 75 per cent of 20 cases treated for a period of a year and a half have shown complete remission. Because of the rapid spread of the disease, testicular cancer cases will be considered cured if they remain in complete remission for two years, he said.

The best results recently reported by other researchers using chemotherapy were 30 to 40 per cent complete remissions. "Unfortunately, many patients with this cancer still receive 'standard' chemotherapy with a drug called Actinomycin D, and these patients only have a 10 per cent chance of complete remission," Dr. Einhorn reported.

The I.U. researchers started trying combination chemotherapy in 1973 using Adriamycin, Bleomycin and Oncovin. With the introduction of the investigational drug, Platinum, in 1974 the present line-up and dosages of drugs were developed. (Platinum, cisdiaminodichloroplatinum, is a derivative of the precious metal.)

This is a "rough regimen," Dr. Einhorn said, with many acute side effects. "It is not for all patients, and it is not for patients whose cancers can be excised by surgery," Dr. Einhorn said, indicating that the regimen should be administered at an academic medical center under optimum conditions. Effects of the drugs must be carefully monitored since they will be taken over a long period of time.
