HERRON VISITING ARTISTS SERIES CONTINUES

C hicago sculptor Richard Hunt will be the next featured artist in the Visiting Artists Series at the Herron School of Art. Hunt, an educator and printmaker known for his works in bronze and stainless steel, will speak at 1:30 p.m. in the Herron auditorium (time and place for each of the series lectures, which are free and open to the public.) Educated at the Art Institute of Chicago, Hunt has received impressive awards, including John Simon Guggenheim and Ford Foundation fellowships. His works are exhibited in private collections across the nation and in notable museums, including the Whitney, Metropolitan, Guggenheim and Hirshhorn.

Brooklyn, N.Y., painter and photographer Juan Sanchez will be the featured artist March 15. His work explores cultural, social and political aspects of his Puerto Rican heritage and the struggle for self determination and empowerment. The Cooper Union School of Art graduate received a master of fine arts degree from Rutgers University, and has participated in more than 100 exhibitions in the United States, Japan, Cuba, Canada, Puerto Rico and Taiwan.

Indiana State University visiting assistant professor Janet Ballweg is scheduled to lecture March 21 about her prints and drawings, which reflect a world she finds surrealistic and filled with humor and visual puns.

The Herron series is supported by the Arts Council of Indianapolis, National Endowment for the Arts and private donations.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION RECORDER & HUSBAND SHARE TOUGHLOVE

It's common for the piercing ringing of a telephone to break the silence of late night or early morning hours at the Chuck and Dottie Ball home. The southwest side couple say they do not mind; they are members of a national parent support network, Toughlove, and often times are the caller's final attempt to get help in a crisis with troubled teens.

Dottie, recorder and librarian for the School of Physical Education, and Chuck are founders of the West Indy Parent Support Group of Toughlove, which helps parents, some court-ordered to attend the 7-9 p.m. Monday meetings at 2302 West Morris Street. They also edit a monthly newsletter mailed to more than 1,200 homes nationwide and conduct active parenting programs for Wayne Township Schools. Life with Toughlove and their son, David, inspired a new book, <u>My Son, My Greatest Teacher</u>, written by Chuck and available at Light and Life Bookstore in Pike Plaza.

The Balls say that many of the Toughlove parents seek simple survival ideas, and that 90 percent of the troubled teens abuse drugs or alcohol.


