Three Concerts

VICE CHANCELLORS TO PERFORM ON INVENTED INSTRUMENTS



Surprise performances by vice chancellors on never-before-heard-of instruments are among the offerings in three free holiday concerts sponsored by the School of Music. All the concerts are in University Theatre, Mary Cable Building. There is no charge. Seating is on a first-come, first-served basis.

First is the IUPUI Concert Band performance Nov. 27 at 8 p.m. The music of famous composers and a piano solo by Darrell Bailey will be featured. In an original composition, "Second Concerto for Faculty and Band," will be guest performances by IUPUI Vice Chancellors Gene Tempel and Bob Martin, and VIP Connie Pottenger, none of whom have any appreciable musical talent. They will play "invented" instruments of dubious origin and quality. Doug Smith directs.

On a more serious note, the <u>IUPUI African-American Choral Ensemble will present a variety</u> <u>concert Nov. 30 at 8:15 p.m.</u> Bessie Colwin will direct the vocal group in a program that includes holiday songs.

Then on Dec. 1 at 8 p.m. the IUPUI Jazz Ensemble presents big band music. Smith will direct the group in the music of Glenn Miller, Duke Ellington and others. Doors open at 7:45 p.m.

CAMPUS COMMUNITY EXCEEDS QUARTER MILLION DOLLAR UNITED WAY GOAL

Even before the final tally, the IUPUI community has exceeded its 1990 United Way campaign goal of \$250,000. As of Nov. 14, we gave or promised \$251,218. Volunteer solicitors helped with the success and generosity broke in many places with 41 departments giving more this year than last. RAJECKI WRITES NEW "STUDENT FRIENDLY" PSYCHOLOGY TEXT Associate professor D. W. Rajecki of the Department of Psychology, School of Science, has written a new text, <u>Attitudes</u>, published by Sinauer Associates, Inc. The 522-page book has 84 illustrations and features broad coverage of the areas of attitudes and public opinion, beginning with basic issues of definition and measurement, and proceeding through mainstream areas of research and theory, and ending with applications in societal domains. It is suitable for courses in psychology, sociology, political science and

RAJECKI marketing. So far it has been adopted as a text at several colleges and universities, including Washington, Illinois, Ohio State, Temple, Toronto and others in the U.S. and Canada.

POLICIES ON TERMINATIONS AND TERMINAL PAY CHANCE While University employees are expected to give a two-week notice of termination, under new policies effective Dec. 1 they are no longer required to do so. Another significant change is that the University's practice of progressive discipline has been incorporated into the policy language. Regarding the change in terminal pay, employees will receive eligible terminal vacation pay benefits regardless of the nature of the termination and length of notice given. These changes are in the 1990-91 personnel policy manuals that will be mailed the first week in December. NEW GIFTS PUSH DENTISTRY'S MINORITY SCHOLARSHIP FUNDING TO \$96,000

The School of Dentistry recently received additional funding from the U.S. Department of Education for a minority scholarship program funded by the department since 1984. Two new scholarships bring the school's current minority funding in the program to \$96,000. As part of the program, two first-year dental students, Kathleen J. Beache and Tonya Stewart each received \$16,000 Patricia Roberts Harris Graduate and Professional Fellowship awards. ...while she graces our campus as distinguished visiting professor with the School of Nursing, prominent nurse leader Elizabeth Carnegie, Ph.D., R.N., is writing the second edition of her highly acclaimed book on the history of blacks in nursing, <u>The Path We</u> <u>Tread</u>. Her book spans 130 years--from 1854 to 1984--and includes black women in nursing who have been left out of history. Carnegie has worked to gain professional acceptance and equality for black nurses. In 1945 she was dean of the School of Nursing at Florida A&M University, when segregation laws were strict. She helped overturn barriers that kept black nurses from full membership in the American Nursing Association.
