Summer workshops introduce young students to computers

*All rainbow colors
I see some morning roses
while sorrow has crept.*

Some readers might recognize the form of this poem. It is a haiku — one of the strictest poetic forms, requiring five syllables in the first line, seven in the second and five in the third.

The form, which originated in Japan, also requires a direct or implied reference to the time of year. This poem contains one, a suggestion of the time when morning roses bloom.

This is a regular haiku. Nothing unusual.

What is unusual about this poem is the way it was created. A seventh-grade pupil wrote it, using the powerful DEC 10 computer at the Purdue School of Engineering and Technology at IUPUI.

Writing poetry is just one of the ways seventh, eighth and ninth-grade students are using the computer in a series of workshops held here this summer.

About 110 pupils will participate in the workshops, which began the first week of June and will continue through this month.

In addition to using the DEC 10, participants are also training on the Apple computer, working with computer graphics, creating game programs and performing statistical analysis.

Judith O. Silence, assistant professor of computer technology, is conducting the first sections of the two-week workshops. She says the pupils are bright and enthusiastic about what they are learning. Most of them, she says, have

expressed an interest in continuing in a computer-related field, and those that do not intend to specialize in studying computers think the knowledge will help them in whatever field they should decide to enter.

One such pupil, Shadan Ardalen, a freshman at Westfield Washington High School, says that he was interested in computers before the workshop, but the IUPUI program has helped him understand better the range of things they can accomplish.

Unlike some adults, Shadan says he feels no fear of computers and is fascinated with what they can do.

Silence says that an early introduction to computers tends to lessen any tensions pupils might have, in much the same way that it is easier for the young to learn foreign languages.

Until Summer Session II ends, I have a temporary checklist clearance. But I believe that the library's front-desk book-return system needs a permanent "checklist" until it discovers a better method to retrieve returned books.

Exceptional children attend IUPUI summer classes


Gifted and talented students entering grades five through nine next fall are enrolled in the Young Scholars Program at IUPUI this summer. A development of the IUPUI Honors Program, directed by Dr. Miriam Langsam, the Young Scholars Program offers innovative courses in areas such as health, problem-solving and creative thinking.

Langsam said that she and her staff are excited about the opportunity to teach these exceptional students. "IUPUI is assuming a responsibility," she said, "to nurture the talents of the gifted and creative. There

is no reason for waiting until they reach college age."

IUPUI offers physical as well as intellectual culture to the young scholars. The IU Natatorium/Track and Field Stadium provides them with opportunities for exercise and play between classes in which they take advantage of IUPUI's computer, communications and science facilities.

Enrollment in the program is limited to 180 students, who are on campus daily from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Classes, which began July 10, continue through July 24.

Amateur athletes of all ages have fun, test skills, win gold

About 3500 amateur athletes from around the state converged on Indianapolis over Fourth of July Weekend to compete in the First Annual White River Park State Games, held at IUPUI's Track and Field Stadium and at other Indianapolis venues.

Indiana is the fourth state in the country to institute statewide competition for amateur athletes. In a letter addressed to the 3500 competitors, Governor Robert Orr called the games an "opportunity for Hoosiers of all ages and skills to explore their potential in the world of amateur sports."

Athletes competed in basketball, track and field, swimming and diving, boxing, cycling, gymnastics, softball, tennis and wrestling.

Unlike traditional youth-oriented competitions, the White River Park State Games give athletes of all ages a chance to compete against others of their age and level of skill and to be recognized for their achievement. A 79-year-old man and a 75-year-old woman were among those receiving gold medals for victories over others in their age-group.

Athletes 30 and under were required to qualify for competition. "Masters," those over 30,

could enter without qualification.

The Games' opening festivities reflected the city's support of amateur sports. Joe Sherman, a student in the IU School of Medicine, and Heash Leese, of the Indiana Sports Commission, opened the Games Friday by lighting an Olympic-style torch. Former Olympic gold medalist Wilma Rudolf administered the "athletes' oath," and Lieutenant Governor John Muts made opening remarks. Entertainment was provided by the Central Indiana Youth Chorus, the Drum and Bugle Corps, and the state champion Center Grove High School band.

The Metros could not withstand a three-run ninth-inning rally by league rival North Central. Butler University's summer baseball team, and went on to lose 7-5 last Sunday afternoon at Ben Davis High School.

The Metros got out of the gate early, breaking a 1-1 tie in the bottom of the second with a four-run explosion highlighted by first baseman Steve Dixon's 2-run homer.




