## MATHEMATICS CONFERENCE HOSTED HERE

A n international mathematics conference will be hosted by IUPUI Thursday through Saturday of this week. The conference, theme of which is "K-Homology, Index Theory & Differential Operators," is representative of the latest research trend in mathematics. It is a synthesis of higher algebra, geometry, topology, and analysis, four branches of mathematics which tended to diverge in the 1960's and '70's.

IUPUI was chosen as the conference site because of faculty member's involvement in parallel research, including that of local organizers Jerome A. Kaminker, professor of mathematics (algebraic topology); Bernard B. Morrel, associate professor of mathematics (operator theory and functional analysis), and Neal J. Rothman, chairman and professor of mathematics (functional analysis and harmonic analysis). It shows the respect which the mathematicians here command in the mathematical community at large. Eminent mathematicians from around the world are expected to attend the three day "workshop" at the I.U. School of Nursing auditorium.

The subject of this conference has connections with mathematical physics and partial differential equations and, through its contributions to those areas, eventually will contribute more to applied fields such as the physical sciences, medical research and engineering.

Keynote speaker, who will give five lectures, is noted mathematician Ronald G. Douglas, a native of Osgood (Ind.) who has been a Sloan fellow, a Guggenheim fellow and a fellow of the National Academy of Sciences, and is now chairman of the mathematics department at the State University of New York at Stony Brook and president of its Academic Senate.

#### RETIREMENT SEMINAR SCHEDULED NOV. 1

"The Non-Financial Aspect of Retirement" will be discussed from 1 to 4 p.m at a seminar sponsored by members of the Staff Relations Committee of the IUPUI Faculty Council and the Faculty Relations Committee of the IUPUI Staff Council.

Guest speakers will be Alan Fischer, M.D., chairman of the Department of Family Practice, School of Medicine; John Kremer, Ph.D., Department of Psychology, School of Science, and Thomas Hines, Personnel, IUPUI. Attendees for the seminar will be by invitation. Individuals will be selected from staff and faculty members by deans or directors of the various campus units. Approximately 100 university employees are expected to attend.

#### HUMAN SUBJECT RESEARCH DISCUSSED

A new guide, "Human Subjects in Research," has been developed by Research and Sponsored Programs to help investigators dealing with human subjects as well as Institutional Review Board members, who review and approve or disapprove proposed protocols, to function as efficiently as possible. The Review Board is composed of 25 members and 50 alternate members from a wide variety of IUPUI disciplines and from the community. The Board meets monthly to discuss proposals that have been circulated to the members in advance by Research and Sponsored Programs.

"We have tried to keep it simple," said R.& S.P. Dean Wendell F. McBurney, pointing out that it codifies procedures that have been in effect for some time. It points up the responsibilities of the University, the Board and its individual members, and the researcher interacting with the committee.

The publication will be distributed at a meeting to discuss the do's and don'ts of human subject research to be held at 10 a.m. Thursday in Room 112 of the School of Nursing. Ms. Joan Straszewski, administrative secretary to the Board, will present revised federal regulations and new requirements for preparing protocols, summary safeguard and informed consent statements.

At present there are approximately 1,200 active studies and 300 investigators at IUPUI using human subjects.


