Final day for online Open Enrollment

Today, Nov. 13, is the last day for full-time academic and staff employees to make 2010 Open Enrollment elections online.

Open enrollment is your annual opportunity to enroll in or change medical, dental, Tax Saver Benefit Plan, Tobacco-Free Wellness HRA, and Personal Accident Insurance elections. Online enrollment is required for those electing the new IU HDHP PPO & Medical Savings Plan. Employees using the online form will receive instant confirmation of benefit elections by email to their IU email account.

To submit elections electronically, log on to <u>onestart.iu.edu</u>, navigate to the Services tab and click on the Open Enrollment link (under the Benefits heading) within the Employee Self Service box.

H1N1 vaccine updates from IUPUI and Clarian Health

Physicians are encouraged to get the H1N1 vaccine as soon as possible. Unfortunately, H1N1 vaccine supplies continue to be very limited. Physicians are able to obtain vaccine at IUPUI Health Services or at a Clarian hospital in which they work. Given the fluid nature of the vaccine supply, physicians are encouraged to monitor the availability of vaccine at IUPUI Health Services or at the Clarian hospitals where they work.

Due to the nationwide shortage of the H1N1 vaccine, the number of doses distributed to Clarian by the Marion County Health Department has been limited in recent weeks. While Clarian, which has requested the largest quantity of vaccine in the county to immunize employees and patients, is scheduled to receive a supply of vaccine each week from the MCHD, this is not guaranteed, and so far weekly shipments have not always occurred.

To ensure Clarian employees working in high-risk areas are immunized, Clarian is revising its 2009 H1N1 vaccination plan, which means that the clinics scheduled for Thursdays have been cancelled.

Until supply becomes more plentiful and distribution more regular, each hospital, under the direction of its chief medical officer and chief nursing officer, will distribute vaccines at their respective facilities. Hospital leadership has developed vaccination plans for their facilities, targeting those departments and units at highest risk.

In addition, a small percentage of each vaccine shipment to Clarian will be set aside for other Clarian employees who may be at high risk due to underlying medical conditions or other circumstances. These doses will be offered on a first-come, first-served basis at Employee Occupational Health Services. For more information, contact EOHS at 962-EOHS.

The Alternative Spring Break Honduras 2010 program is a week-long medical mission to the coastal town of Trujillo and nearby village of Rigores, where a team of IUSM physicians and students will provide primary care, present small public health seminars, and work hand in hand with local health care providers to administer excellent care to the people of Honduras.

As part of the inaugural trip last year, the group helped treat more than 1,000 patients with illnesses ranging from scabies to hydrocephalus. Additionally, the group offered other services such as fluoride treatments and eyeglass fittings.

Plans are underway to expand the trip from last year, and physicians interested in taking part in the trip from March 6-13 are encouraged to contact one of the co-chairs. Physicians can expect to work alongside enthusiastic MSI and MSII students, educating future Hoosier doctors while also providing

Gender bias on faculty search committees

"It Depends on the Lens: Unconscious Gender Bias on Faculty Search Committees" will explore an area not often discussed.

IUSM chairs, directors and division heads are strongly encouraged to send their faculty to this important program. Every participant will learn something that will increase their effectiveness as a search committee member.

This is an interactive seminar lead by professionals from Cornell University. The seminar will feature a recorded performance by the Cornell Interactive Theater Ensemble (CITE). In a scenario depicting a fictional faculty search committee meeting, CITE actors will portray five faculty members in the midst of a discussion that will reveal the implicit, unconscious biases that can affect the search process. After the performance, two of the actors from the performance will answer questions from the audience while in character. Finally, research on gender bias will be presented.

Women's Health Lecture – Substance Abuse in Pregnancy

Indiana has an alarmingly high incidence of substance use by pregnant women. Only 5 to 10 percent of pregnant women are identified and receive treatment for their substance use disorder.

To educate health care providers about productive ways to screen and assist pregnant patients for substance abuse, the IU National Center of Excellence in Women's Health is partnering with the Indiana Perinatal Network and Indianapolis Healthy Start to present "Incorporating Screening for Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drugs into Prenatal Care." The training will be directed by James J. Nocon, MD, clinical associate professor of OB/GYN and director of the prenatal recovery clinic at Wishard Health Services.

The lecture will be from 8:15 to 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, Nov. 25, in the IU Cancer Research Institute (R4) auditorium. The lecture is free with one CME credit provided.

This week on Sound Medicine

Tune in at 2 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 15, or 8 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 17, to *Sound Medicine*, the award-winning weekly radio program co-produced by IUSM and WFYI Public Radio (90.1FM) in Indianapolis. The program is hosted by Barb Lewis.

This week, Robert Martin of the Pew Campaign on Human Health and Industrial Farming will explain the concerns that livestock in large confined animal feeding operations are being fed antibiotics which are leading to more resistant strains of bacteria.Edward Kravitz, PhD, a Harvard neurobiologist, will discuss his discovery that female fruit flies send a signal to males when they don't want to mate and how this could lead to clues about controlling insect populations and insect-borne diseases such as malaria.

Nathan Wolfe, PhD, Lorry I. Lokey Visiting Professor in Human Biology at Stanford University and director of the Global Viral Forecasting Initiative, will his discovery on where malaria originated which hopefully could lead to a cure.

Trisha Suppes, MD, PhD, professor of psychiatry and behavioral science at Stanford University School of Medicine, will discuss the new treatment guidelines for bipolar disorder issued by the American Psychological Association.

Marie Savard, MD, ABC Medical News contributor, will critique the Holmes-Rahe Life Stress Inventory and will suggest improvements.

In this week's Sound Medicine "Checkup," Jeremy Shere, PhD, will explore shower head germs.
