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This week on Sound Medicine

Tune in at 4 p.m. Sunday, March 25, to *Sound Medicine*, the weekly radio program co-produced by IUSM and WFYI Public Radio (90.1 FM) in Indianapolis. The program is hosted by Barb Lewis. Co-host of this week's program is Kathy Miller, MD.

This week Sound Medicine (March 24 and 25), covers the emotional and psychological challenges that can face health professionals and physicians who treat patients with life threatening diseases. The Schwartz Center Rounds is a new program at the Indiana University Cancer Center that allows medical professionals to openly discuss the emotions, grief and frustrations they face as care-givers of patients with cancer. Contributing reporter Sharon Alseth talks with Jane Powers, L.C.S.W, oncology social worker at the IU Cancer Center, and Nasser Hanna, M.D., assistant professor of medicine at the IU School of Medicine, about the program and how it has affected them.

Sound Medicine host Barbara Lewis continues the discussion on Schwartz Center Rounds with three medical professionals responsible for organizing the event at the IU Cancer Center. Sandra Petronio, Ph.D., professor of communications at Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis, acts as the facilitator to involve all participants during the forum. Caroline Carney Doebbeling, M.D., M. Sc., associate professor of psychiatry and medicine at the IU School of Medicine and a research scientist at the Regenstrief Institute, Inc., organizes the monthly event through the IU Cancer Center CompleteLife program. Robert Goulet, M.D., professor of surgery and medical director of the Breast Care and Research Center at the IU School of Medicine, is the physician leader for the group.

The American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgery projects the number of knee replacements will increase by 673 percent in the next twenty-five years, and the number of hip replacements will almost double.
