IUSM to welcome largest incoming class

The IUSM Class of 2015 will don a physician's white coat Saturday, Aug. 13, in a ceremony at the Murat Theatre, 502 N. New Jersey St., which marks the beginning of an intense four-year curriculum.

The incoming 328-member class is the largest in the medical school's history. They will gather with friends and family at 3 p.m. for the White Coat Ceremony, an annual rite of passage. Keynote speaker Lisa Harris, MD, chief executive officer and medical director of Wishard Health Services, will present "We're All in This Together."

Following Dr. Harris' remarks, the students will cross the stage and be assisted by a medical school faculty member into a white coat. The students then recite in unison a physician's pledge whose origins are attributed to the Greek physician Hippocrates.

Sculpture installation marks new eye center

Installation began Friday, Aug. 12, on a large work of public art by renowned sculpture Don Gummer, who attended Ben Davis High School and the Herron School of Art before making his home in New York and Connecticut. Titled "Open Eyes," the piece will anchor the green space to the east of the institute.

The installation precedes several events marking the completion of the \$30 million, 77,000-square-foot advanced vision science center. Friday, Aug. 19, the new center will host the second annual Eugene and Marilyn Glick Eye Institute Vision Research Symposium from 7:30 a.m. to 1 p.m., in its Spitzberg Conference Room, followed by a dedication ceremony, including IU President Michael McRobbie, at 3 p.m. in the IUPUI Campus Center.

Saturday, Aug. 20, Glick Eye Institute will be open to the community, including free health screenings, building tours and art projects for children, including sidewalk chalk, drawing and face-painting.

Global health receives endowment

The newly-formed IU Center for Global Health has received its first endowed faculty position. The Donald E. Brown Professorship in Global Health was established with a gift of \$1.5 million from Donald E. Brown, MD, an IU alumni and software entrepreneur.

Dr. Brown is co-founder and CEO of Interactive Intelligence, a global provider of IP business communications software and services. In 2007, Dr. Brown gave \$1 million to the Indiana-Kenya Partnership/AMPATH, which is coordinated by the IU Center for Global Health. This new gift builds on his commitment to supporting global health programs.

Robert Einterz, MD, associate dean for global health, director of the IU Center for Global Health and professor of clinical medicine at IUSM, will be the first to hold the endowmed position, which will be used to support faculty leading global health programs that aim to eliminate health disparities by advancing global health research and education and delivering health-care services to underserved populations across the globe.
