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PHILANIHROPY LAUNCHES 10-YEAR PROGRAM WITH \$15.1 MILLION IN GIFTS

PHILANTHROPY

The IU Center on Philanthropy at IUPUI announced last week a 10-year program of development launched by gifts totaling \$15.1 million. The unprecedented support, announced by IU President Thomas Ehrlich, will enable the Center to expand programs of

teaching, research and public service. Lilly Endowment continues its support of the Center with a new 3 1/2-year grant of \$11.4 million. Another \$3.7 million is from a group of anonymous donors which has a deep interest in expanding philanthropy worldwide and is enthusiastic about the work of the Center. On accepting the generous grants, Robert Payton, director of the Center and professor of philanthropic studies at IUPUI, simplified the complexities of the Center's work and mission by saying, "We study the theory and practice of good works. We know that involvement in good works is one of the most effective ways to help people, especially young people, find meaning and purpose to their lives." He added that the gifts to the Center will help advance the work of organizations involved in direct service to their communities, to the disabled, disadvantaged, the homeless and others in need in our society. "In announcing the grants, Ehrlich said, "These splendid grants will enable the Center to take giant strides in teaching, research and service--the primary mission of the University. Working on all the IU campuses, the Center will lead the way in creating an entirely new field of study in higher education--the study of philanthropy and voluntary action." He noted that the work of the Center will extend beyond the academic community into the nation, "whose people need more understanding about philanthropy and public service, both distinctive threads in our history and character that help shape our national identity." John Mutz, president of Lilly Endowment, said the Center "will take a leading role nationally and it will benefit Indiana by increasing the flow of intellectual activity and adding prestige to IUPUI's burgeoning campus." IUPUI Chancellor Gerald L. Bepko noted that the "development of the Center on our campus will make it possible for scholars from universities and the public and private sectors to come together to help advance understanding of philanthropy and volunteerism."
