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RECOGNITION DINNER SET FOR MONDAY

A total of 301 employees of Indiana University at Indianapolis will receive pins signifying the completion of 5, 10, 15, 20, and 25 years of service at the annual recognition ceremony to be held at 7:30 p.m. Monday in Room M124 of the Union Building.

The honorees have given a collective 2,930 years of service to the institution.

All campus personnel are welcome to attend the ceremony. Chancellor Maynard K. Hine said that supervisors and administrative officers whose employees are being recognized are especially encouraged to be present to add their congratulations.

The ceremony will be preceded by a banquet given by I.U. President John Ryan for the Quarter Century Club when the 15 employees who have just completed 25 years of service will be welcomed into the group.

Thomas Duane, director of personnel, will preside at the ceremony and introduce President Ryan and Chancellor Hine, both of whom will make brief remarks. After receiving their pins the employees will pass through a receiving line composed of the deans and heads of the various schools and divisions.

LEGISLATIVE REPORTS XIV

Legislative Action--Senate Bills

- SB 2 -- Creates Commission for Higher Education for state to regulate, review, and coordinate higher education. Power is granted to approve or disapprove of establishment of new regional campuses. Amended, passed by House 88-2, and sent to Governor.
- SB 290 -- Creates special division within the Department of Mental Health to be devoted to attack on drug abuse; appropriates \$200,000. Amended, passed by House, 84-2, and sent to Governor.

SB 463 -- Makes trustees of state universities personally liable for damages inflicted in a riot if found guilty of willful and wanton negligence with regard to the protection of university property. Amended and passed, 36-7, and sent to House.

Legislative Action--House Bills

- HB 1358 -- Permits state universities to appoint police officers who would have police powers; authorizes such officers to enforce the regulations of the universities and authorizes university officials to request the assistance of state, county and municipal peace officers; confirms authority of the universities to control traffic on university property. Amended and passed by Senate, 46-1, and sent to Senate-House conference.
- HB 1430 -- Creates a statewide medical education system in cooperation with hospitals and educational institutions throughout the state. Amended and passed by House, 79-0, and sent to Senate.
- HB 1444 -- Makes students enrolled in Indiana Vocational Technical College eligible to receive state scholarships. Amended and passed by Senate, 44-0, and sent to Governor.
- HB 1722 -- Adds drug addiction to the definition of psychiatric disorders. Passed by House, 86-1, and sent to Senate.
- HB 1844 -- Authorizes state universities to award financial aid to students on basis of financial need, academic achievement, or other reasonable basis approved by governing boards. Amended and passed by Senate, 34-5, and sent to House-Senate conference.

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Applications for scholarships, grants, loans and the Work/Study program are available and must be filed by April 1. They may be obtained at the new Law School (Room 132), the Krannert Building on the 38th Street Campus (Room K165), the Normal College of the American Gymnastic Union and the Herron School of Art. Employers who have students working under the Work/Study Program should remind them to reapply for 1971-72.

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Sports Notes--Final standings in the Graduate Basketball League have been posted by Nick Kellum, director of Intramural Activities and coordinator of Sports Clubs for IUPUI. Tied for first place in the Capital Division were the Sophomore Med B team and the Fatty Acid Droppers, with nine wins and one loss apiece.

First in the Central Division was the Senior Dents I team with an eight to one record. Three teams in this division were tied for second place--Thirty Plus, Red Carpetiers, and Bishops Bombers--each with seven to two.

The Graduate League playoffs opened last Saturday (March 20) with four games pairing the four top teams in each division. <u>Final playoffs will be held this</u> <u>Saturday and Sunday, both at 1:30 p.m.</u> All games are being played at the Normal College, 1010 West 64th Street.

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<u>Jackpot (Almost)</u>--Mrs. Richard Low, project chairman of the A.B.C. Club of Brandywine Township, has counted a grand total of 530,000 Betty Crocker coupons, thus getting tantalizingly close to their 600,000 goal needed to buy a kidney dialysis machine for the Medical Center. Many schools, church groups and other clubs are also collecting the coupons and will turn them in April 1. The News Bureau has received a total of 19,066, more than 7,000 last week. New Nursing Program--Marian College and IUPUI have entered into a cooperative program to train students for the bachelor of science degree in nursing beginning next September.

Under the agreement, approved by the faculties of both institutions, <u>students</u> may enroll at Marian College where they will study the liberal arts and sciences for two years, after which time the participants will automatically transfer to the School of Nursing at the Medical Center.

"One of the new features of this nursing program," according to Sister Mary Norma Rocklage, academic dean at Marian, "is that the actual grades the nursing students earn at Marian will transfer with them. Customarily transfer students only have their credit hours transferred to another institution, and they lose the grade-point standing and class rank achieved at the first college or university."

The Bachelor of Science in Nursing program requires four years of college and training. In the past, Indianapolis-area residents wishing to earn the degree from I.U. have had to live on the Bloomington or other I.U. regional campus for at least the first year of work in the liberal arts and sciences.

Under the cooperative program, nursing students in the Indianapolis area may either live at home and attend Marian or live on Marian's campus. "Their final degree, however, will be from I.U. and housing at the Medical Center will be available during the last two years," Sister Norma said.

During the second year of training at Marian, nursing students will take two courses under the direction of Indiana University. In addition, <u>Nursing School</u> <u>Dean Emily Holmquist anticipates that the freshmen and sophomore students will</u> <u>be able to conduct some hospital field work, a feature which often is lacking</u> during those years on the other campuses.

I.U. also has agreed that Marian students eligible for and receiving financial aid during the first two years will have that aid continued, as long as their economic and scholastic conditions do not change.
