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
CHILD ARTISTS DESIGN RILEY'S FIRST 'MIRACLE CARDS'

MAY TO GIVE FOUR LECTURES ON MEDICAL ETHICS

The author of books on the subject of ethics in medicine and law and former chairman of religious studies at IUB, William F. May, Ph.D., will give four lectures on campus Dec. 4. May is now the Carry M. Maguire Professor of Ethics at Southern Methodist University. His lectures include two case studies. The first is at 8:15 a.m. in Myers Auditorium, Wishard Hospital, and focuses on internal medicine; the second is at 2 p.m. in University Hospital, C261, and focuses on OB/GYN. The keynote lecture entitled "An Ethical Process for the Care of a Dying Patient: Implications for Words and Deeds" is at 10 a.m. in Emerson Hall, 342. CONSTRUCTION PREP TO CLOSE PARKING LOT

The lot—actually three lots—37, 39 and 47, will be closed. If you use these spaces, Willard Hanshew, director of Parking, Transportation and Special Services, suggests that if you are a B parker, you use the East Garage or lots 58, 59 or 80 that are south of Vermont St., the dental school and the South Garage. E Parkers can find space east and north of the East Parking Garage, which includes the garage itself and lots 69, 70, 71, 72, 73 and 83. (See your campus map for locations.) Hanshew also wants us to know that when construction begins, traffic will increase and he asks that we be careful driving or walking near the area.
