THE CAMPUS READING GROUP WOULD LIKE TO KNOW: READ ANY GOOD BOOKS LATELY?

C hared readings of a few "really interesting and stimulating works that can help us better understand our contemporary world" will be read in the coming year by IUPUI students, faculty and staff across campus and across disciplines. The readings will be taken from a list developed on campus. The shared readings can help develop a sense of academic community and shared intellectual experience at IUPUI. The IUPUI shared readings group, under the auspices of the IUPUI Council of Undergraduate Learning, is asking everyone to recommend a favorite, important, well-written book or other written work in print on just about any subject that can appeal to a broad range of readers. You are asked to submit recent readings that you think are so important that they should be read by the entire campus committee and then discussed as widely as possible during the next academic year. Contemporary novels, essays, biographies, histories, poetry, commentary and collections will be considered. From three to five books or writings will be selected and announced; through the shared experience of reading the same books, formal and informal conversations can develop, while other connections, accidental and serendipitous, also can emerge. Some authors of the selected works may be invited to speak on campus, and schools and groups will be encouraged to plan meetings and discussions. WINNING PLAYS TO BE READ AT YOUTH THEATRE SYMPOSIUM THIS MONTH

Best friends, loving mentors, nurturing adults and other childhood delights, as well as war, sickness, family problems and other childhood terrors are addressed by the four playwrights who are winners in the 1991 national IUPUI Youth Theatre Playwriting Competition. Their plays will be showcased with staged readings at the fourth biennial IUPUI Youth Theatre Playwriting Symposium Mar. 22-23, where Jed Davis, scholar and expert in youth theater, will give the keynote address. Winners of the contest are Julie Brinker of Bloomington, Ill, for "Rachel's Night," about a young leukemia victim whose disease is in remission and who explores her problems through dreams; Brian Kral of Las Vegas, for his poignant play "Paper Lanterns, Paper Cranes," about a group of Japanese children who witnessed the bombing of Hiroshima; James Still of New York City, for "Amber Waves," an all-American story about a struggling farm couple and their teen-agers who face family ills and hard times, but hang together "because it's not over till it's over," and Sharon Whitney of Portland, Ore, for "Totty--Young Eleanor Roosevelt," written around the classical ugly duckling story of the young and not-so-pretty Eleanor's experiences in boarding school abroad.
