NEW HOPE FOR SCARS

A new medical technique for smoother looking skin may bring hope to thousands of individuals with acne scars, selected wrinkle lines and other facial disfigurements.

A substance known as Zyderm Collagen Implant is injected under the skin with a fine needle to raise indentations and depressed scars to the level of the surrounding skin. Zyderm is a highly purified form of collagen, a natural protein that provides strength to the skin in humans and animals, and is prepared from cattle skin. The body does not reject it, and eventually allows blood vessels to nourish it.

Currently considered an investigational device, Zyderm Implant is not yet approved by the Food and Drug Administration for general use although it has been studied for more than five years in California.

Dr. C. William Hanke, assistant professor of dermatology at the School of Medicine, is the chief investigator for Zyderm at I.U. "Previously dermabrasion was our best treatment for acne scars," Dr. Hanke said. "Zyderm can be used in patients who may not be ideal candidates for dermabrasion. In certain patients, combination treatment with Zyderm and dermabrasion may provide the best cosmetic result. While it is not a cure-all, we feel very fortunate to be involved in the investigation of this exciting new substance."
