LEGISLATIVE REPORTS III

LEGISLATIVE ACTION -- NEW BILLS

House:

- HB 1042 (Latz) -- Would provide for protection of civil rights of patients in psychiatric hospitals. Assigned to Human Affairs committee.
- HB 1056 (Arnold, Foreman) -- Would require hospitals and nursing homes to provide itemized statements to in-patients, including dosages and costs and brand names of prescribed drugs. Assigned to Public Health and Environmental Affairs committee.
- HB 1065 (Voisard) -- Would raise to 18 the age of compulsory school attendance except in cases where student would graduate before 18th birthday.

 Assigned to Education committee.
- HB 1093 (Deckard, J.R. Harris) -- Would provide for establishment of University of Southern Indiana by granting full autonomy and independence to present Indiana State University Evansville campus. Assigned to Education committee.
- HB 1109 (Thomas) -- Would permit college and university guards to participate voluntarily in law enforcement training programs. Assigned to Public Safety committee.
- HB 1127 (Gaylord, Hall) -- Would create an Indiana Council on Science and Technology and appropriate \$60,000. Assigned to Public Policy committee.
- HB 1129 (Sinks) -- Would prohibit experimentation on live animals by elementary and high school pupils. Assigned to Education committee.
- HB 1134 (Thomas) -- Would permit persons 18 and older to be parties in civil suits and to appear before courts without guardians. Assigned to Judiciary committee.
- HB 1157 (Schultz) -- Would allow State Board of Health to establish family planning services program with services available to all citizens of child-bearing age. Assigned to Judiciary committee.

Senate:

- SB 7 (Sheaffer) -- Would permit each member of General Assembly to appoint one person to each state-supported law school each year. Assigned to Public Policy committee.
- SB 34 (Park) -- Would allow credits against state income tax for gifts to elementary and high schools, public and private, on same basis as credits now allowed for gifts to higher education institutions. Assigned to Finance committee.
- SB 35 (Snowden) -- Would mandate public high schools to teach consumer education.
 Assigned to Education committee.
- SB 51 (Thompson, Hayes) -- Would provide for a University of Southern Indiana at Evansville. Assigned to Education committee.
- SB 61 (Ullrich, Sheaffer) -- Would re-establish State Board of Health as State Board of Environment and Health with all powers and authorities for environmental affairs in Indiana. Assigned to Public Health committee.

- SB 78 (Garton) -- Would provide for award of state scholarship on basis of academic excellence. Assigned to Education committee.
- SB 87 (McCormick) -- Would establish a state emergency medical services commission. Assigned to Public Policy committee.

ACCREDITATION TEAM VISITS THIS WEEK

A team of 11 examiners from the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools will be on campus from Tuesday through Friday this week for the first IUPUI accreditation visit.

The examiners will investigate the academic and support programs and personnel of all schools and divisions which offer degrees through the doctoral level.

This is the first time that programs other than those at the undergraduate level have been examined for accreditation as operationally separate units of the "main" campuses. If favorably reviewed, institutional accreditation may be granted by about mid-March.

Dr. James R. East, associate dean of the School of Liberal Arts, has spearheaded efforts to organize information, material and arrangements for the NCA visit. He edited a 298-page manual, the IUPUI Self-Study, which is probably the most comprehensive collection of information about all units located at IUPUI.

He has arranged for the NCA team to be headquartered in the Dean's Conference Room in Cavanaugh Hall. However, the team members will look into every corner of the five campuses of IUPUI, visit classes, talk with students, staff and faculty and attempt to evaluate what we are doing as an institution and how well. Chancellor Hine will host the team at a dinner at his home one night of their visit, but team members mostly will informally go their own way.

Dr. East asks that any who are contacted by team members extend co-operation for their requests. The team members are: Dr. Paul L. Dressel, assistant provost and director of institutional research, Michigan State University, team chairman; Dr. William T. Brazelton, associate dean, Technological Institute, Northwestern University; Dr. Paul H. Cashman, vice-president for student affairs, University of Minnesota; Dr. J. B. Wilson, chairman of the Department of Bacteriology, University of Wisconsin-Madison; Dr. William Martin, associate professor of microbiology, University of Chicago.
