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Weaver to receive Darnell Award at Medicine Grand Rounds

IU Geriatrics will present the Dr. Jeffrey C. Darnell Medical Student Geriatrics Achievement Award for 2009 to Chad H. Weaver, a May IUSM graduate interested in a career in dermatology and geriatrics. The award recognizes a medical student for outstanding service and leadership in the care of older adults.

The presentation will be made during the IU Department of Medicine Grand Rounds at noon Friday, June 5. The lecture, "Innovative Models of Providing and Coordinating Care for Older Australians," will be presented by Steven Counsell, MD, director of IU Geriatrics, in the Wishard Hospital Myers Auditorium.

Dr. Weaver worked on multiple research projects from 2007 to the present with mentors in both geriatrics and dermatology including Drs. Jeffrey Travers, Stephen Wolverton, Margaret Gaffney and Douglas Miller. His projects involved a literature review of geriatric dermatology, a study of access to care for the elderly in dermatology, and a comparison of prices in topical medications over time.

In addition, Dr. Weaver assisted multiple elderly and homebound individuals with transportation to physician appointments, matched patients with social organizations to improve their well-being and aided multiple nursing homes in communication with Spanish-speaking patients.

Dr. Weaver plans to complete a residency in dermatology at the Mayo Clinic-Rochester and will be developing a special one-year fellowship to pursue his interest in geriatric dermatology through the Mayo Clinic.
