Sixty years ago ago Helen Keller challenged Lions International delegates to become "knights of the blind." Since then, Lions Clubs have made helping the visually impaired one of their primary goals. While they work year 'round, Lions have designated March at National Eye Donor month. The need for eye tissue has never been greater, and Lions Clubs across the state are conducting

exhibits and drives so that one day they may reach their goal of having a cornea available for every Hoosier whose sight can be improved through corneal transplant. In Indiana, the Lions Eye Bank—a leader among the nation's accredited eye banks since its establishment in 1958—makes available hundreds of donated corneas for use by Hoosiers, as well as other tissue for medical research. The Eye Bank is at the IU School of Medicine Department of Ophthalmology on our campus. Lions Clubs help fund the Eye Bank, and members do volunteer work to operated a network of 84 eye collection centers in the state.

In addition, Lions continue their fund-raising efforts that since 1947 have contributed more than \$3 million toward equipment purchase for our Department of Radiation Oncology at the Medical Center which is used to treat certain types of cancer. Last week some of the facilities which have benefited from the Lions' programs were visited by a director of the International Lions Club, Cecil E. Ettinger.

HARRIS NAMED OUTSTANDING TEACHER FOR 1985

Robert A. Harris, associate chairman and professor of biochemsitry, was awarded the 1985 Edward C. Moore Award for Outstanding Teaching during the recent Learning Resources Symposium for faculty. One student who nominated him for the award said, "In spite of his great accomplishments, he maintains a humility which yields an impeccable integrity to his work and creates an environment where new ideas are readily born." Among his other accomplishments, Dr. Harris has directed the freshman medical biochemistry course and our students have improved their national rankings in the national board examinations from 45th to 65th percentile. A graduate of Iowa State in 1962, Harris received both his master's and doctorate degrees from Purdue. Besides teaching, Dr. Harris serves as student counselor and adviser and is a visible role model as he challenges and motivates students to nurture their own interests. He is also a major contributor to the nationally acclaimed biochemistry text for med students, "Textbook of Biochemistry with Clinical Correlations."

SHIPPS' BOOK A HIT AMONG SCHOLARS

Although a book on Mormonism may not zoom to the top of the best-seller list, Jan Shipps is feeling like a real celebrity as she embarks on a 10-day tour that includes speaking engagements and autograph parties all across the country. Jan, professor of history and director of our Center for American Studies, has written a small but powerful volume called Mormonism: The Story of a New Religious Tradition. Published by the U. of Illinois Press, the book has received advance rave reviews from Mormon and non-Mormon scholars alike. A round-table discussion about her book was held in the center last week with comments by Shipps, Marvin Rytting, associate professor of psychology at IUPUI-Columbus, and Roland (Tony) Sherrill, associate professor of Religious Studies at IUPUI.

Although Shipps is a well-known Mormon scholar and has contributed often to scholarly and general audience publications, this is her first book. It was more than 10 years in the making. Although Jan is not a Mormon, (she is an active member of the First United Methodist Church in Bloomington), her objectivity and fairness has won her respect and election five years ago to the presidency of the Mormon History Association—the first woman and first non-Mormon to hold the office of the 1,000—member group.

BOSCHMANN LILLY FELLOWSHIP RECIPIENTS

Erwin Boschmann, professor of chemistry, is one of 10 Hoosiers who were recently named the 1985-86 Lilly Endowment, Inc. open fellowship winners. He was chosen from among 46 applicants who were nominated by institutions with enrollments of more than 7,500 students. Boschman proposes to use his fellowship year developing himself for good science teaching. He plans to read and reflect on theories pertaining to teaching and motivation and broaden his understanding of the practical ideas on these subjects. He hopes to culminate his fellowship by sharing his findings with other chemistry teachers in Indiana and surrounding states in a two-day symposium. Boschman said he feels that science teaching in the U.S. is not what it should be and this use of his fellowship year might be a small step in correcting that situation. Winners of the fellowship are all men and women in mid-career who will use their break from academic routine to seek personal and profession enrichmant.
