#### White Coat Ceremony: IUSM takes aim at physician shortage

The class of 2011 - 294 strong – will assemble in Indianapolis Saturday for the annual White Coat Ceremony, an event that blends the passion and enthusiasm of first-year medical students with the time-honored traditions of the profession.

Friends and family members will gather at 3 p.m. at the Murat Theatre, 502 N. New Jersey St., for the ceremony. At that time, each medical student will be given their first white physician's coat and then, in unison, will repeat the Physician's Oath pledging to care for as well as cure patients.

Richard Gunderman, MD, PhD, MPH, associate professor of radiology, pediatrics and liberal arts, will deliver the 2007 address, welcoming the students to the profession of medicine. His address will draw from his latest book, *We Make a Life by What We Give*, which will be published by Indiana University Press in December.

This year's entering class represents an increase of 14 students in response to projected physician shortages in the state and the nation. An IUSM task force predicted that if more physicians are not educated, the state would have a shortage of 1,975 doctors by 2015.

# **Entrepreneurial Awards of Distinction deadline Aug. 31**

Applications are being accepted until Aug. 31 for the 2007 Indiana University Entrepreneurial Awards of Distinction, presented by the Johnson Center for Entrepreneurship and Innovation at IU's Kelley School of Business.

This is the third year for the awards, which recognize outstanding emerging and established companies within the state of Indiana for their achievements in growth, innovation and entrepreneurial spirit.

All public and private corporations, proprietorships and partnerships located in Indiana and founded prior to the 2004 fiscal year with revenues greater than \$1 million are eligible to apply. Nonprofit organizations also are invited to apply for the Social Entrepreneurship Award, which is presented to an organization with a social mission that demonstrates entrepreneurial excellence in innovation and/or spirit.

The 2007 IEADs awards banquet will be held at the Indiana Roof Ballroom in Indianapolis on Thursday, Oct. 18.

#### NIH issues requests for EUREKA awards

A request for applications has been posted by several NIH institutes for the new Exceptional, Unconventional Research Enabling Knowledge Acceleration (EUREKA) award.

The award is "To encourage exceptionally innovative research....from investigators who are testing novel, unconventional hypotheses or are pursuing major methodological or technical challenges. The potential impact of the proposed research must be substantial, in terms of both the size of the scientific community affected and the magnitude of its impact on that community." The awards are not renewable. Support may be requested for up to \$800,000 in direct costs over a four-year period.

#### This week on *Sound Medicine*

Tune in at 2 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 12, to *Sound Medicine*, the weekly radio program co-produced by IUSM and WFYI Public Radio (90.1 FM) in Indianapolis. The program is hosted by Barb Lewis.

This week on *Sound Medicine*, Judith Monroe, MD, Indiana State Health commissioner, will look at the national botulism poisoning outbreak and why the recall has been difficult to manage. Four Hoosiers have been sickened by botulism from the recalled canned goods.

Aaron Carroll, MD, an assistant professor of pediatrics at IUSM and a researcher with the Regenstrief Institute Inc., has examined two decades of medical records and will discuss whether or not pediatric malpractice is a national crisis.

Are there genes for alcoholism? John Nurnberger, MD, PhD, professor of psychiatry and director of the Institute of Psychiatric Research at IUSM, will discuss his research into genes that are linked to addiction.

Animal behaviorist Andrew Luesher is director of the animal behavior clinic at Purdue University. He is involved in studies of dogs that exhibit compulsive disorders and will discuss the new drug "Reconcile" used to treat separation anxiety in dogs. Reconcile is Prozac formulated for canines.
