NOTED DOCTOR-LECTURER-AUTHOR COMING

Dr. Robert H. Williams, professor of medicine and chief of endocrinology at the University of Washington and editor of the soon-to-be-released book, To Live and to Die, When, Why and How, will be at IUPUI Friday. He will talk on the book's subject at noon in the Emerson Hall Auditorium.

In the book, Dr. Williams and 20 contributors treat questions that result from medical advances like organ transplantation and society's social problems. The topics covered -the changing attitudes and policies about euthanasia, suicide, sexual activity, marriage, birth control, abortion, welfare and the treatment of criminals -- are being widely debated among laymen and within professional communities.

Dr. Williams has received the Outstanding Chairman of Medicine Award from the Association of Professors of Medicine, the Distinguished Leadership Award from the Endocrine Society, the Banting Award (ADA), Stengel Award (ACP), Minot Award (AMA), among others.

LEGISLATIVE REPORTS IX

House Bills

- HB 1134 -- Would permit persons 18 or older to be parties in civil suits and to appear before courts without guardians. Amended and recommended for passage by Senate Judiciary Committee.
- HB 1169 -- Would require physicians and laboratories to report all cancers and malignancies to State Board of Health. Amended and passed by Senate, 45-3; now in House-Senate conference committee to resolve differences in House and Senate versions of bill.
- HB 1277 -- Would prohibit denial or revocation of professional and occupational licenses because applicant or holder has been convicted of a misdemeanor or felony. Passed by Senate, 36-13, and sent to Governor.
- HB 1759 -- Would allow Indiana University students who will graduate in next commencement to vote in elections for alumni trustees. Recommended for passage by Senate Education Committee.
