Kreisle named competency director

Regina Kreisle, MD, PhD, adjunct professor of pathology at IUSM-Lafayette, has been named the competency director for using science to guide diagnosis, management, therapeutics and prevention.

Dr. Kreisle is also a professor of comparative pathobiology at Purdue University. She serves as course director and primary instructor for second-year medical courses "Human Pathology" and "Evidence Based Medicine" and as the competency coordinator for IUSM-Lafayette. Previously, Dr. Kreisle taught human pathology at IUSM-Evansville for two years.

In addition to her interest in competencies, Dr. Kreisle has been involved in introducing a number of innovation teaching methods including problem-based learning, team-based learning, competency-based assessments and computer-based resources.

IUSM will celebrate the retirement of Julie J. McGowan, PhD, chair of the Department of Knowledge Informatics and Translation, director of the Ruth Lilly Medical Library and professor

of knowledge informatics and translation and pediatrics, from 2 to 4 p.m. Monday, June 20, in the Van Nuys Medical Science Building atrium.

An Illinois native, Dr. McGowan joined IUSM in 1999 as the director of the Ruth Lilly Medical Library. In March 2002, she was appointed an associate dean and led the establishment of the Office of Information Resources and Educational Technology, as well as oversaw the reorganized programs of Medical Education Resources, Medical Illustrations and Library Services. She is also an adjunct professor in the IU School of Nursing and holds a part-time appointment with the IU School of Library and Information Science.

Dr. McGowan previously served as associate dean for health sciences informatics and library resources at the Charles A. Dana Medical Library, University of Vermont at Burlington and codirector of the Vermont Initiative for Rural Health Informatics and Telemedicine. She holds a doctorate in medical education and a master's in medical iconography from the University of South Carolina, a master's of library and information science at the University of Maryland and bachelor's degrees in art and philosophy from Randolph Macon Woman's College, Lynchburg, Va.

New immunization requirements

IUPUI Health Services has announced changes to immunization standards for clinical faculty, staff and students at the IU schools of medicine, dentistry and nursing. These changes have been made to comply with new immunization recommendations and requirements from the US Center for Disease Control and Prevention and Indiana State Department of Health:

Varicella (Chickenpox, shingles): The self-report of varicella or herpes zoster disease is no longer considered evidence of immunity. The result of this change is that many individuals will now need to get blood tests for varicella. IUPUI HS has taken steps to minimize both the inconvenience and cost of this change.

Pertussis Vaccine: IUPUI HS now requires Tdap (a standard vaccine for tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis) for individuals who have not already received it. The CDC recommends that all health care workers receive Tdap if they have not already done so and regardless of how recently they may have received the Td vaccine.

TB Surveillance: IUPUI HS will require that all TB skin tests (the standard test for TB surveillance) be read within 48-72 hours. Individuals who request TSTs read prior to 48 hours will be advised that they need to come back to have it read. Individuals who request TSTs read after 72 hours will be advised that they need to have another test placed.

Indiana CTSI announces awards

The Indiana Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute has announced about \$3 million in pilot funds and awards for medical students and researchers at IU, Purdue and Notre Dame. These grants are provided by the Indiana CTSI Collaboration in Translational Research (CTR) Award, Young Investigator Award (K Award) and Training Award (T Award) programs.

Approximately \$2.3 million dollars will support career development grants to young physicians and scientists working on promising research projects. An additional \$500,000 will support new research projects aimed at advancing the fight against diseases such as breast cancer, prostate cancer, multiple sclerosis and osteoporosis. Traffic delays — June 25
