YEAR-END TAX TIPS FROM PROFESSOR JEGEN*

There still is time to establish a qualified retirement plan--for example, an individual retirement account (an "IRA") and/or a spousal IRA (a "SIRA")--to provide yourself or your spouse with federal and Indiana income tax deductions for the contributions which are made under the plan. The earnings on the contributions (and on the earnings) under each type of plan are exempt from income taxation as the earnings are earned.

Thus, if one of these plans are started soon enough in an individual's working life, the individual can have (in, for example, 35 years) over one million dollars in the fund. Further, there are some income tax advantages when the contributions and the earnings are withdrawn from the fund, either as a lump sum distribution or as an annuity, at retirement or at the death of the individual for whom the fund is established. If the individual for whom the fund is established dies before the fund is distributed, some of the fund may be exempt for federal estate tax and Indiana inheritance tax purposes. As a general rule, these plans allow reasonable choices as to the form of the fund investments (for example, savings accounts, bonds, and other securities). **Lawrence A. HONORS & ACCOLADES

Tyra Phipps, a program manager at the Continuing Studies Women's Center, has been chosen as the first woman inductee into the Frostburg (Md.) State College Hall of Fame. She was the first woman to play official intercollegiate athletics at Frostburg State and the only woman to have competed on a men's team. The tennis player went on to a successful professional career. Phipps contracted multiple sclerosis in 1977 which caused partial paralysis in her right side, but she has overcome the paralysis and is back teaching tennis.
