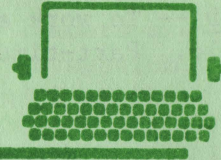


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NEW DEGREE OFFERED

For the first time, students in a non-health field will be able to earn a Ph.D. degree at IUPUI. On May 15 the Indiana Higher Education Commission approved granting a Ph.D. degree in psychology with an emphasis in rehabilitation psychology, a program created by the Department of Psychology of the Purdue University School of Science at IUPUI. The department has offered bachelor's and master's degrees in the field for several years.

Both Purdue and I.U. trustees already had approved the degree. Rehabilitation psychology deals with the social and physical restoration of persons who are physically or mentally handicapped. It tends to be long-term in nature, bringing together a broad range of services for the individual. Dr. Dan Landis, chairman of psychology, pointed out that the new program is one of only five in the nation.

Dr. Edward C. Moore, executive dean and dean of the faculties, described the new degree as a major step forward in quality that adds an entirely new dimension to education at IUPUI.

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EQUIPMENT INVENTORY TO BE TAKEN

In order to comply with federal regulations, the university has developed a new property control system. First step is to take an inventory of all equipment. This inventory will begin on June 1 and will be completed by July 3. It will involve capital equipment having a value of \$500 or more in all academic and administrative buildings. Hospitals, Auxiliary Enterprises, and Internal Service Departments are generally excluded.

The Manufacturers' Appraisal Company, a firm of professional scientific and health care equipment appraisers, will perform a room-by-room inspection in search of capital equipment. Upon locating an item meeting the criteria, the inspectors will attach a decal to it and record it in the University property records. Department equipment inventory records will be useful to the appraisers. Each department should have available any information regarding personal, rented, or loaned equipment located on campus, so that the appraisers can avoid tagging and recording this equipment. Information also should be available regarding equipment which is in the custody of a department but will not be located in a university building during the inventory.

Dr. K.N. Dileepan, research associate in the Department of Pharmacology, has been invited to speak at the International Symposium of Somatostatin to be held in Athens, Greece, June 1-3. Title of his presentation is "Mechanism of Action of Somatostatin on Renal Gluconeogenesis. Involvement of Adrenergic Stimuli and Calcium."
