This award is given annually to one to three individuals nationwide. Dr. Nalepa will be presented with the award in Boston in April. In his research, Dr. Nalepa aims to understand how the human genome regulates cell division and how this knowledge can be applied to develop personalized therapies for children suffering from cancer.

Chuck Dietzen, MD, president and founder of the Indianapolis-based Timmy Global Health, will present the 2012 Marian Godeke Miller Lecture at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, March 22, at the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation Mobley Auditorium (HPER C100) in Bloomington.
