Campus Center to be new home of IMCU, Jagtag

After 51 years located near or in the Student Union on the IUPUI campus, the Indiana Members Credit Union relocated to the new Campus Center at West Michigan Street and University Boulevard Dec. 3. A grand opening celebration is planned for Friday, Dec. 14.

Campus Card Services, which issues Jagtag, also is moving to the new center. Campus Card Services will permanently close its operation in the Union Building on Tuesday, Dec. 11. A satellite office in University College room 127 will be open until the UC office opens in suite 217 of the Campus Center.

Clinical trials new guidelines and training sessions

Training sessions to guide investigators and clinical trials personnel on new requirements (Public Law 110-85) for registration will be offered:

- 10 to 11 a.m., Thursday, Dec. 13 Emerson Hall auditorium
- 3 to 4 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 18 ROC Auditorium

Studies of drugs for a serious or life-threatening disease or condition that enrolled the first patient before

Sept. 27, and will still be ongoing on Dec. 26, must submit required information by **Wednesday**, **Dec.** 26. If the study has previously been registered, additional data elements are required by that date.

Applicable clinical trials that enroll the first patient between Sept. 27 and Dec. 26 must submit required information by Dec. 26. If you have an applicable clinical trial that enrolls the first patient after Dec. 26, you must submit required information no later than 21 days after the first patient is enrolled. Additional data elements must be submitted by Sept. 27, 2008, for studies that have been registered prior to Sept. 27, 2007. These trials include:

- Trials of Drugs and Biologics controlled, clinical investigations, other than Phase I investigations, of a product subject to FDA regulation (Phase II- IV trials now require registration); and
- Trials of Devices controlled trials with health outcomes, other than small feasibility studies, and pediatric post-market surveillance.
- NIH encourages registration of ALL trials whether required under the law or not.

Consistent with current FDA and ClinicalTrials.gov guidance, the NIH interprets serious and life-threatening disease or condition to mean: (1) diseases or conditions where the likelihood of death is high unless the course of the disease is interrupted and (2) diseases or conditions with potentially fatal outcomes, where the endpoint of clinical trial analysis is survival.

The seriousness of a disease is a matter of judgment, but generally is based on such factors as survival, day-to-day functioning, and the likelihood that the disease, if left untreated, will progress from a less severe condition to a more serious one. For example, acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS), all other stages of human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection, Alzheimer's disease, angina pectoris, heart failure, cancer and many other diseases are clearly serious in their full manifestations. Furthermore, many chronic illnesses that are generally well managed by available therapy can have serious outcomes. For example, inflammatory bowel disease, asthma, rheumatoid arthritis, diabetes mellitus, systemic lupus erythematosus, depression, psychoses, and many other diseases can be serious in some or all of their phases or for certain populations.

Any investigational drug that has received fast track designation by the FDA is considered a drug to treat a serious disease or condition.

Who is responsible for making sure this registration is performed?

Ultimately, it is the responsibility of the principal investigator. However, sponsors will many times perform the actual registration work for the PIs. Rather than assume that this requirement has been fulfilled by the sponsor, it is best to ask prior to enrollment of any subjects whether the clinical trial fully registered.

NIH-sponsored trials should be registered by the Institute that is funding the research. The PI is responsible for initiating this registration with the agency. Industry-sponsored trials (industry-written protocol) should be registered by the sponsor. Contract language is included to specify that Sponsor will do this registration. Investigator-initiated trials (for which industry has supplied drug or grant funds) should be registered by the PI.

Trials for which PIs hold their own INDs or IDEs should registered by the PI. Multi-site trials should be coordinated among the sites and registered by the "lead sponsor" so that ClinicalTrials.gov does not receive multiple registrations for the same trial.

What assistance can Indiana University provide?

The university is in the process of developing a procedure for identifying studies that will meet the registration requirements. More details regarding the procedure will be provided as they become available.
