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HERRON DEAN ACCEPTS NEW POST

Benjamin de Brie Taylor, dean of the Herron School of Art, has accepted a new post in Chicago. He has been appointed director of the Institute of Design at Illinois Institute of Technology.

Dean Taylor, who has headed the Herron art school at IUPUI since 1970, plans to take up his new duties in September.

Chancellor Maynard K. Hine commented: "Under Dean Taylor's leadership, the Herron School of Art has made significant progress in attracting able faculty, in curricular development, and in expanding its teaching facilities. Although we regret his leaving us--and Indianapolis, we wish him well in his new post."

Dean Taylor said: "While I am reluctant to leave what has been a satisfying and rewarding position, I am very much interested in the internationally noted design programs at Illinois Institute of Technology. I look forward to new opportunities for learning and experience."

At IIT, where he also will serve as full professor, Dean Taylor will head a school with an unusual history. The Institute of Design traces its origin to the Bauhaus, a group of artists, architects, and designers that flourished in pre-Hitler Germany. The Institute was established in 1937 as the "New Bauhaus" by the late Laszlo Moholy-Nagy. It became part of IIT in 1949.

Since Dean Taylor joined IUPUI in 1970, Herron expanded its activities into the adjacent and former museum building after the Indianapolis Museum of Art moved into its new home on West 38th Street. Curricular development was especially evident in visual communication, art education, and art history. In addition, the school sponsored an expanded schedule of public events, including exhibitions and lectures, with emphasis on service to the immediate community near its facilities.

Herron's professional strengths in preparing practicing artists and teachers of art are nationally recognized. Recently, to serve the school and other divisions of IUPUI, the areas of art history and appreciation have been expanded.

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CHANCELLOR HINE HONORED
