## NOTE

The Student Activities office in the Student Union Building has closed. Mike Wagoner, Kathy Schroerlucke, and Virgie Montgomery will combine efforts in the Student Activities office in Cavanaugh Hall, Room 322 (Ext. 3931).

Most tickets formerly handled by the Student Activities office will be available at the check cashing and ticket window in the main lounge of the Student Union.

General Cinema tickets, however, will still be handled by Student Activities in Cavanaugh Hall. Price is \$2.50 for any ticket.

Parking on Other I.U. Campuses—Official action has been taken to insure reciprocation of parking privileges for faculty and staff members among the various I.U. campuses. To facilitate identification and administration, the first step, which most campuses already have adopted, is use of alphabetic designations on parking decals or tags. The following indicates by permit letter where you may park on the other I.U. campuses. Colors vary, the letter is the key.

- 1. "A" Permit--Good in all zones except those designated exclusively for students.
- 2. "B" Permit--Good in all zones except "A" and zones designated exclusively for students.
- 3. "E" Permit--Good in "E" zones or others that may have a letter designation farther along in the alphabet (except those designated for restricted parking.

For easier recognition by police and others, refinements to be considered later include greater standardization of design and colors from campus to campus, as well as placement of the decals or tags on vehicles.


