BRAZILIAN EDUCATORS VISIT IUPUI

Edmundo Marques, pro-rector for graduate studies at the Federal University of Rio Grande do Sul, and Norberto Rauch, rector of the Pontifical Catholic University of Rio Grande Do Sul, Brazil, are in the middle of a two-week trip to Indiana where they are seeing the best IUPUI and Indianapolis have to offer.

To date they have visited with faculty members in the area of computing sciences, the Schools of Engineering and Technology, Social Work, Education, Medicine, Nursing and the Herron School of Art. They also have been feted by the International Programs Steering Committee, seen the "500-Mile Race" Track and Museum, toured the downtown area and attended a Rotary luncheon meeting.

After trips to West Lafayette and Bloomington, they will resume their IUPUI tour Wednesday with stops at the Schools of Dentistry, Science, Liberal Arts, and the Center for American Studies.

"We want to give them a good overview of the range of IUPUI and its urban setting," said Paul Nagy, associate dean of the faculties. "We hope to spark more interest in faculty and student interchange."

The trip has been arranged through the Partners of the Americas, the Washington-based organization that fosters cooperation with Latin American countries. It was through a "Partners" trip last winter that Nagy and R. Bruce Renda, dean of engineering and technology, visited the universities in the state of Rio Grande do Sul, met their faculties and urged that their representatives visit IUPUI. Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil's southernmost state, is Indiana's "partner state."

Ruth Selkurt, a member of the Cheer Guild of Indiana University Hospitals and a "very special" hospital volunteer, was featured by Norman Vincent Peale in his radio commentary, "The American Character," last Thursday. He said, in part; "For anyone who's ever needed courage to carry on in the face of adversity. Or strength to serve others when personal burdens loom large. The story of Ruth Selkurt provides a lifetime of inspiration...working with patients. Recruiting volunteers. Raising funds. Handling the hospital gift shop. These jobs and others Ruth Selkurt has done. Despite a long series of interruptions for more than two-dozen cancer-related operations...Ruth has refused to let these stand in her way. Which is one reason why she became the first-ever recipient of the "Indianapolis Volunteer-of-the-Year" Award. 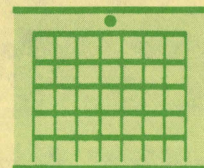
