NNG Conference in Minnesota

"Putting the Pieces Together: Social Change Philanthropy, Today and Tomorrow" is the theme of the 1998 NNG National Conference. It will provide a distinctive opportunity to experience the balm of fall in the North Country, while addressing challenges and possibilities for progressive funders. Minnesota, the Land of 10,000 Lakes, over 750 foundations, and a history of progressive politics, sets an ideal backdrop for discussion of issues critical to funders and our constituents, while providing space to network and find renewal with our peers.

The Conference Committee began work in August of last year, to ensure a different kind of NNG gathering than ever before. The bulk of the conference will be hands-on: skills building sessions, learning clusters, and a day of discussion on progressive grant-making. Our keynote speaker – Senator Paul Wellstone (D-MN) – will give his perspective on funding and the grassroots.

The planners have designed a conference filled with challenges yet cognizant of the need for revitalization, so that participants will bring something substantial – a new idea, a new strategy, a new alliance – back with them to their work. To keep us going, the Committee has planned fun social events, including a host reception, an open city night, a closing party, and growth and challenge through caucus and working group meetings.

Skills Building sessions are being designed to be of value to both novice and seasoned grantmakers. Participants may choose

tracks (see the "Conference at a Glance" on page 2). Whatever your experience level or interest, we are confident that you will find a session that will provide you with new information.

Learning Clusters are small-scale, in-depth discussions on topics proposed by NNG members and their grantees. The clusters will address emerging issues and offer space for new linkages between NNG members and our constituencies. Sessions were carefully selected to address the diversity of progressive funders and issues critical to "Putting the Pieces Together." Grantmakers have teamed with practitioners in designing constructive sessions that will provide concrete lessons and advise participants on next steps.

A diverse group of thinkers, including progressive funders and informed critics, will introduce a provocative final day of exchanging information and viewpoints that is sure to get your synapses firing. What does social change philanthropy mean to you? How does it take shape in your work? We will hear cutting edge thinking, ask questions, respond, and engage the panel and one another. Discussion groups will follow, continuing to build links between issues, and enabling the development of strategies we can take back to our shops as we improve on this craft of social change philanthropy.

The Minnesota Host Committee will provide a sense of place and culture, connecting the national level of social change philanthropy with the local experiences, including the wide diversity of people native to Minnesota and the Twin Cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul. A host reception event will be held at CreArte, an exciting cultural space in the heart of Minneapolis that exemplifies the Latino/a culture, as well as the diversity of the lively urban neighborhood where CreArte is nestled. You can tour the gallery, which features local artists; see and hear local performers; and relax and enjoy a variety of Mexican, Chinese, and Greek foods. You will experience the incredible and complex diversity of the Phillips neighborhood, of the Twin Cities, of Minnesota, all in one evening!

You are invited to participate in one of three one-day, pre-conference site visits on Wednesday, September 23:

- **The Land and The People:** a tour of the Mille Lacs Ojibwe Reservation and an opportunity to see and hear about urban, rural, environmental, and tribal issues from American Indian perspectives;
- **Culture, Community and Change:** a cultural immersion experience through visiting with organizations in the Gay/Lesbian/Bisexual/Transgendered community, health and cultural wellness, and arts organizations working for community change;
- **Tour de Sprawl:** a tour and political analysis of industrial







redevelopment areas to wetland restoration to affordable housing initiatives, linking socially just land use policies and environmentally just urban growth policies.

The site visits will conclude with a dinner and discussion with Rebecca Adamson of First Nations Development Institute, providing an opportunity to "put the pieces together" in a holistic approach to culturally appropriate, values-driven philanthropy.

The Radisson Hotel and Conference Center is located on 25 acres of naturally preserved marshland, and as you can see, the NNG Conference Planning Committee and the Minnesota Host Committee have been very busy planning an innovative, stimulating, and refreshing conference for you there! It is our hope that you will take this exceptional opportunity to meet with progressive funders on a national level, and to develop links that support and build a more powerful, progressive movement for social change.

I invite you to join me in Minnesota. You will be challenged. You will know renewal. You will feel welcomed. ■
