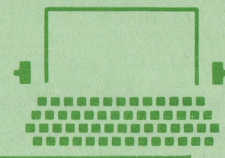

## VISITING SCHOLAR TO TALK ABOUT COMPUTERS AS "MOST HUMAN MACHINE"

**A**uthor/professor Pamela McCorduck will lecture here and in the community during her stay Nov. 2-13 as an IUPUI visiting scholar, hosted by the Humanities Institute. She will discuss the topic of five books she has written about computers and their impact on society. Director of the Institute Frances Dodson Rhome said, "McCorduck boldly argues that the computer is the most civilized and human machine ever invented since it amplifies the human property that has always served us best -- our own intelligence, our ability to manipulate symbols." McCorduck, professor of English and literature at Columbia University, will lecture in several classes and will lead discussions and give free public lectures. On Nov. 3 at noon in the City Center she will lead the discussion, "A New Culture." On Nov. 5 at noon she will be the featured speaker for the Institute's annual educators' breakfast. Nov. 9 at 3 p.m. in the Education Building, third floor commons, she will lead a faculty forum, "Intellectual Impact on Computing." On Nov. 10 at 7 p.m. in DeBoest Hall, the Indianapolis Museum of Art, she will discuss "The New Humanities and Arts." On Nov. 12 from noon-1 p.m., the Dept. of Psychology will host a brown bag luncheon where McCorduck will present "Computers and Anxiety" to a history of psychology class, Krannert Building, Room B68. Finally, on Nov. 13 from 2-3 p.m., she will wrap up her visit here with a faculty seminar, "The Computer Enters the Legal Dream" in the faculty lounge, School of Law, host for the presentation. 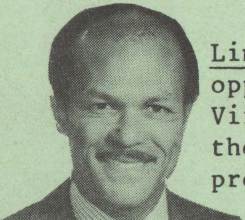
## WARNER HEADS MEDIA PROJECTS

With one show already aired on cable TV, **Amy Conrad Warner**, special media projects coordinator, is in her new office in the administration building, where she will be working closely with the Dean of the Faculties William M. Plater to develop more special television and radio shows that will focus on the expertise of IUPUI faculty and staff. Formerly with the Campaign for Indiana, she has been consulting with experts in Telecommunications, Instructional Media Systems, MERP and Learning Resources. The first TV show on Oct. 20 was a live, call-in on American Cablevision which focused on the Supreme Court justice selection process, with special emphasis on Judge Robert Bork. Upon her recent appointment to the National Advisory Mental Health Council of the Alcohol, Drug Abuse and Mental Health Administration, **Angela B. 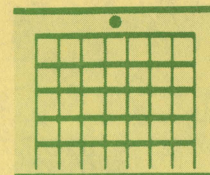
