MOVING COMPANY CIRCLES THE GLOBE IN 8TH CONCERT

A dance around the globe to music from many cultures and times is planned for the 8th anniversary spring concert of the IUPUI Moving Company, directed by Mary Maitland Kimball, associate professor in PE. "A Universal Language" will feature ancient and original music and movement from nine countries, including all-American New Orleans early jazz. There are three performances, Apr. 25-27, 8 p.m., in the Mary Cable Theatre. Guest choreographers and Kimball have designed compositions to music from Japan, Poland, Africa, Puerto

Rico, Spain, France, the U.S., and from an "Empty Street" everywhere in the world. Choreographers assisting Kimball include Margot Faught who founded the IUPUI Moving Company, Iris Rosa, Gina Moss, Melli Hoppe and Laura Davis, who also performs a solo performance, "Peasant Pas from Giselle, Act I," which was first performed in the Paris Opera in 1841. A toe-tapping medley of scenes set to songs from the Smithsonian Institution collection of classical jazz will be presented in "Mardi Gras Vignettes." Dancers and flappers will tap and shimmy to the music of King Oliver, Jelly Roll Morton, Sidney Bechet and James P. Johnson, jazz composers from the '20 and '30s. The finale brings the concert home with "The Parade," and "Riverboat Shuffle," set to the 1927 tunes of Indiana's own Hoagy Carmichael. Tickets to "An International Language" are \$4. The organization pays tribute to the venerated Dr. Wells for his "continuing involvement with civic and public service programs which exemplify his spirit of altruism. His wise counsel and uncommon achievement have earned him recognition and 26 honorary degrees from our nation's most respected institutions." Such luminaries as Vice President of the United States Dan Quayle, Indiana Governor Evan Bayh, U.S. Senators Dan Coats and Richard Lugar and Indianapolis Mayor William Hudnut III are honorary chairmen of the event that will benefit B'nai B'rith, one of the oldest voluntary service organizations in the U.S. Other VIPs helping with the award include the presidents of Indiana and Purdue universities, Thomas Ehrlich and Steven Beering, respectively, and Rev. KIWANIS KEEPS 60-YEAR TRADITION WITH HELP FOR KIDS AT RILEY

Back in 1930, the Kiwanis of Indiana donated the K-wing at Riley Hospital, and all through the years right up to last week, they have made many gifts that help save the lives of hundreds of sick kids. On Apr. 11 the tradition continued when the Kiwanians gave more than \$50,000 worth of lifesaving pediatric shock room equipment to Riley. Tom Dunham, last year's district Kiwanis governor, presented the gift on behalf of the 10,500 Kiwanis club members in Indiana. On behalf of the staff and patients at Riley, the gift was accepted by Dr. Richard L. Schreiner, Riley's physician-in-chief. The Kiwanis Clubs are not stopping here; they plan to raise more than \$1 million in the next several years to enhance Riley's emergency room facilities.
