# "QUIET EXCELLENCE" NOTED BY DEAN OF FACULITIES

The dedication of staff and faculty as they serve record-breaking numbers of students is lauded in the following statement by William M. Plater, executive vice chancellor, dean of the faculties and professor of English:



"With 27,518 students officially registered this fall, IUPUI has set yet another enrollment record. The growing recognition of IUPUI as a center for high quality undergraduate and professional education has undoubtedly been the major factor. The faculty, librarians, staff—and students—who have built this reputation of quiet excellence should take great pride in this tangible recognition of their achievements. As we struggle to meet unprecedented demand for classes, advising sessions, parking spaces, seats in lecture rooms, study carrels and financial aid, we must

recognize that quality comes at a price. Our faculty and staff have contributed mightily during the past three or four years and the greatest effort lies before us, as the real success of this new era of growth will be the numbers we graduate—not how many we admit.

"When we have run out of classrooms, saturated our computing systems, parked cars on every flat surface between the canal and the White River, and exhausted the patience of office-mates with complaints about the folly of taking in yet more students, what then? For most of us, the answer for 1990-91 will be the same as it has been for the past 20 years. We will dig deeper into our stores of patience, struggle with the pains of invention and creativity, and thrill secretly at beating the odds once again. There is no place in American higher education quite like IUPUI, largely because there's no group of people quite like the faculty, librarians, staff and students who have made IUPUI their home. Yes, we have another record enrollment, but the real news is that ever increasing numbers of our students will succeed because it matters to each of us personally. IUPUI's best year yet is certain to be 1990-91."

### TWO GATHERINGS TO FOCUS ON LIBERIAN CRISIS AND TOWN MEETING FOR CHILDREN

The crisis in Liberia and the city's and the world's children are the focuses of two free public programs this month sponsored by the IUPUI Office of International Affairs, the School of Medicine and the School of Social Work, along with the Indianapolis Committee for UNICEF.

First is "Liberia: Beyond the Current Crisis," Sept. 21, 1-5 p.m. in the basement auditorium of the Medical Science Building. It will feature presentations by American and Liberian health professionals and others who have firsthand experience in the area. The recent assassination of Liberian President Samuel Doe and the historical, socio-economic and cultural perspectives that have contributed to Liberia's current political climate will be discussed. The presenters include David Van Reken, M.D., pediatrics; Ruth Stone, Folklore Institute, IUB; Wvannie Scott, School of Nursing; Ralph Cummings, consultant, and Bill Ardill, M.D., ELWA Hospital, Liberia.

Second, the day after a candlelight vigil for children Sept. 23 at 6 p.m. in University Park, is a "Town Meeting for the Children of Indianapolis," Sept. 24, 8:30 a.m.-4 p.m. at the Catholic Social Services Center, 1400 N. Meridian. Resolutions will be drafted for forwarding to the first World Summit for Children at the United Nations, Sept. 29-30. To keep with the theme, "Think Globally, Act Locally," the morning session will address the needs of the world's children, and the afternoon will focus on the needs of Indy's children. # "OUR" DOC BOWEN LENDS NAME TO NEW RESEARCH CENTER

Former Indiana Governor Otis R. Bowen, M.D., whose lifetime contributions to family medicine are world renowned, will have another namesake, the Bowen Research Center at the IU Medical Center, which will focus on the role of primary care physicians in rural and urban environments. One of the first centers of its kind in the country to focus mainly on family doctors, it is expected to develop methods for these practitioners to reduce preventable disease and curb rising health care costs. Research in prevention and promoting healthy lifestyles will be multidisciplinary by medical doctors and social scientists in various schools at IU and elsewhere. Deborah Allen, M.D., chairman of the Dept. of Family Medicine, said, "This is a different way to approach medicine. We have to find a way to affect behavior and prevent, not just treat, diseases." Her department, in collaboration with the School of Public and Environmental Affairs, will operate the Bowen Research Center. Deborah A. Freund, Ph.D., prominent social policy researcher in SPEA, is senior researcher for the Center. A dinner to announce the Center and honor Doc Bowen, "Indiana's most distinguished, mild-mannered, country doctor," and former U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services, was Sept. 12 at the Indiana Roof.


