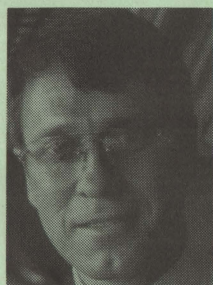
## TICKETS TO OUR NIGHT AT THE ZOO GO ON SALE SOON

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**EDUCATION'S BARMAN TOPS AMONG TEACHERS OF TEACHERS** Because of his talent for stimulating intellectual curiosity, his sensitivity and availability to students, Charles R. Barman has been named the 1990 Distinguished Teacher Educator for Indiana by the Indiana Association of Colleges of Teacher Education. The associate professor in the School of Education was also judged on his professional and academic of science education, which is typified by a teacher's lesson supplement he wrote about the environment that is used in 48 states. The supplement won him the 1989 Indiana Outstanding Project Learning Tree Forestry Award. In 1987 Barman received the Burton W. Gorman award from the School of Education for creative teaching of kindergarten through senior high school science teachers. Concentrating on in-service education for elementary school teachers, Barman has developed materials for students in the School of Education and teachers' workshops which focus on the learning cycle of children, including how they self-regulate their own learning process. The project is supported by a grant from the National Science Foundation.--M. Hopper

## UNIVERSITY THEATRE GETS IAC CASH AND KUDOS

University Theatre took two out of three top ratings and 35 percent of the available grant monies in funding from the Indiana Arts Commission's Theatre Arts Project Support for fiscal 1990-91. The IUPUI Theatre for Young Audiences received \$10,000 for the fourth biennial National Playwriting Competition that is now underway and \$8,500 for the annual Theatre for Young Audiences touring show. On a 7.0 scale, the IAC panel ranked the tour highest among all participants with a 6.71 and the playwriting project came in third with 6.53, very close to Bloomington's playwright's projects second place rating of 6.58. The panel noted that the grant applications were well-written, that there is good audience participation, and that the touring show brings theater to urban children who might not otherwise see live theatre.
