CONFERENCE TO LOOK AT YOUTH SUICIDE, ABUSE, DEPRESSION

A larming rates of youth suicides, sexual and physical abuse of children, eating disorders and a host of other psycho-social ills that strike children are among the issues that are expected to draw more than 200 people from across the nation to the National Advocates for Child Psychiatric Nursing (ACPN) Conference at the Hyatt Regency Oct 29-30. Keynote speaker is Angela Barron McBride, professor and associate dean for research development and resources, School of Nursing. Her address is titled "Child Psychiatric Mental Health Nursing: Coming of Age." Participants can select from 21 concurrent sessions on a wide range of issues. Faculty for the conference include people from the IUPUI campus, as well as those from other areas of the country. Two awards will be presented by the ACPN. The Indiana region award goes to Sue Marquis Bishop, associate professor and chairman, Graduate Dept., Psychiatric/Mental Health Nursing, School of Nursing. The national award will go to Patricia Pothier who is on the faculty at the U. of California at San Francisco. COMPETENCY TESTING NUDGES TEACHERS BACK FOR WRITING

While it received a negative reaction by some, the Indiana Statewide Test of Educational Progress (ISTEP) for students was welcomed by most school teachers. Since it includes writing and since students have not done so well in this area, many teachers of writing—500 in fact—came to a recent Indiana Teachers of Writing (ITW) conference here. Barbara L. Cambridge, assistant professor of English at IUPUI and executive director of ITW, said that the professional development for teachers of writing is crucial" because many of them did not learn about the subject in college. Teacher colleges are especially weak in offering good writing instruction." One 16-year veteran of teaching writing Patricia Keefe of West Noble Middle School in Legonier, attended the conference and said, "All of a sudden everybody is concerned about quality writing." She adds, "It's a bad situation if schools graduate students who cannot write a paragraph." Cambridge expects school corporations and colleges and universities to enhance support and programs for teachers of writing. —J. Grim

OCTOBER BROUGHT BEGINNING OF GRANT FOR MS RESEARCH

Charles L. Schauf, professor and chairman, Dept. of Biology, School of Science, is a renowned physiologist and researcher of multiple sclerosis, a disease that attacks the central nervous system. It is most often diagnosed in young adults and results in varying degrees of disability. For a dozen years Schauf's research on MS has been funded by the Indiana Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society. A new competitive renewable grant of \$105,864 was awarded him, to begin officially Oct. 1. His research, "Block and Restoration of Conduction in Demyelinating Disease" is expected to further aid in the use of basic science to treat MS.--S. Rogers


