THE PRESIDENT AND IUPUI PARKING

Chancellor Hine's phone has been unusually busy this last week because of the many inquiries he has received regarding interpretations of President Nixon's "economic freeze." As might be expected, the University has requested official rulings from governmental agencies on problems associated with salary increases, changes in parking fees, etc.

He reports that as of last Thursday morning no final official rulings have been received. As soon as decisions are available, he promises wide-spread dissemination of official information.

One firm decision is that a graduated fee schedule will remain in force for green parking decals.

The revised IUPUI parking regulations which are effective Wednesday had set a single \$3 monthly charge for the green decals. A graduated fee, ranging from 62 cents per month to \$3 a month, depending upon salaries, will continue for at least the duration of the wage-price fee.

This action was taken voluntarily by Chancellor Hine in the spirit of the President's program. There has been no official indication that the proposed parking fees would have been inconsistent with the terms of the President's program.

Applications for new green decals must still be sent to the IUPUI Safety Department because the current series of parking decals will expire Wednesday. This decision does not affect applications or fees set for the new blue parking decals or for the new red student parking decals.

SPACE RACE REPORT

Some mild confusions have been reported among those who are preparing the vehicle registration forms for parking decals under the system which will begin Wednesday for all IUPUI campuses and divisions.

One entry on the form carries a box to be checked if you want to use a payroll deduction to pay for your decal. Alongside the box is a line, which ought to be signed to authorize the deduction.

The cryptic entry "Time Employed" should be answered with an indication of full time or part time pay status. "8 a.m. to 5 p.m." and "Since Sept. 1, 1969" are wrong answers.

The Safety Department reports that more than 2,500 of the red student parking decals have been purchased so far and that the processing of applications for the blue and green faculty and staff decals is proceeding without significant delays.

HOW TO LOVE FOOTBALL

GRADUATED GLOOM

Considerable national and local publicity has been given lately to the problems of supply and demand facing recent graduates with teaching degrees. Now comes the Wall Street Journal with similar reports of a surplus of accountants. The Journal reported last week that City University of New York placed only 19 per cent of its 1971 accounting graduates, down from 60 per cent in 1969, and that major national accounting firms have sharply reduced the openings available for new graduates. Starting salaries for accountants have frozen in the \$10,000-\$14,000 range after rising for the last several years, according to the Journal.
