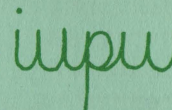


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LEGISLATIVE REPORTS VII

LEGISLATIVE ACTION -- Senate Bills

SB 308 (Gutman) -- Would provide for licensing and regulation of ambulatory outpatient centers, effective February 28, 1972. Passed by House 78-0 and sent to Governor.

LEGISLATIVE ACTION -- House Bills

HB 1029 (Cloud, Bodine) -- Would allow foreign students to attend Indiana public schools tuition free. Passed by Senate 44-0 and sent to Governor.

HB 1089 (Gordon, Voelker) -- Would give Indiana State Board of Medical Registration and Licensure power to waive for final licensure of physicians any provisions on candidate's previous training, education, and practice. Passed by Senate 41-0 and sent to Governor.

HB 1179 (Richardson) -- Would provide for free tuition at state universities for dependent children of city police killed in line of duty. Passed by Senate 40-0 and sent to Governor.

HB 1223 (Lamkin, Voelker) -- Would provide for the subdivision of Indianapolis "communities" to be governed on certain matters by community councils elected by residents of the "community." Amended, passed by Senate 27-15, and sent to Governor.

The program is to include a discussion of Commission functions and statements by members of the public that they feel will be helpful to the Commission in its development of a master plan for post-high school education in Indiana.

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TOURNAMENT PAIRINGS ANNOUNCED

Pairings for the Indiana University-Purdue University Regional Campus Tournament have matched the new IUPUI Metros against IU-PU Fort Wayne in the second of two games scheduled for the tournament's Southern District eliminations in the Chatard High School gym on February 29.

The first game, scheduled for 7 p.m., will match IU East from Richmond against IU Southeast from Jeffersonville. The winner of this game will play the winner of Northern District match between IU Northwest and Purdue North Central.

Winner of the IUPUI-IUPU Fort Wayne match will meet IU Kokomo, which has a first round bye, in the tournament finals at Kokomo's Haworth High School gym on March 4.

Tickets for the Indianapolis games will be sold at the Chatard gym door for \$1.50, covering admission for both the IU East-IU Southeast game and the IU-PU Fort Wayne and IUPUI match.

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DR. NEAL RESIGNS RCC POST; DR. ROTHE APPOINTED

Dr. David A. Neal has resigned as director of the Research Computer Center and Chancellor Maynard K. Hine has appointed Dr. Carl F. Rothe as interim coordinator of the center. Dr. Rothe is professor of physiology and is chairman of the IUPUI Research Computer Center.

Dr. Neal will continue teaching in computer science as it relates to biophysics and medicine. Chancellor Hine expressed his appreciation to Dr. Neal for his contributions to the growth and development of the Research Computer Center which has become important in a new computing plan for IUPUI.

Dr. Rothe as interim coordinator of the Center will serve also as chairman of an administrative council composed of two additional faculty members, Dr. Larry K. Steinrauf, professor of biochemistry, and Gerard T. Forget, assistant professor of computer technology.

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FELLOWSHIPS AND GRANTS

A small sum of money has been made available to provide minimal support for pilot projects in science (including the physical, biological, and social sciences, mathematics and engineering). Application for use of these funds may be made under two headings:

1. Faculty Summer Fellowship - A faculty member with the rank of associate professor or under may apply for the sum of \$1200 to be used as personal support while he conducts a pilot research project or performs the preliminary work which will allow him to qualify for a support project of his own. No teaching duties may be accepted during the period that this Faculty Fellowship is made available.
2. A small Grant-in-Aid of Research will be made to cover the necessary expenses of a well-defined project whose completion might lead to sufficient data collection to permit application for additional and larger monies.

Applications will be judged on the quality of the research, the potential for publication, and the potential for broadening that financial base for research to the individual, his department, or the institution.

Application forms may be obtained by calling Sponsored Programs, Ext. 8287. The deadline for receipt of applications is March 15, 1972.
