IU unveils \$10 million Innovate Indiana Fund

Indiana University has unveiled a new \$10 million venture capital fund aimed at investing in the development of innovations and technologies created at the university. The announcement was made Friday, Dec. 4.

Indiana University President Michael A. McRobbie said the goal of the new Innovate Indiana Fund would be to assist in the translation of new concepts and technologies created at IU into the marketplace as commercial products, services and treatments developed by emerging technology-based companies.

Funded solely from university and private donor sources, the Innovate Indiana Fund will provide \$5 million over the next five years in early stage seed funds and another \$5 million over that same time for late stage seed

investment. Individual early seed investments would range from \$50,000 to \$150,000 each, while late seed investments would range from \$150,000 to \$350,000 each, according to IU Vice President for Engagement Bill Stephan.

Physician workforce survey info

The Center for Indiana Health Workforce Studies and Indiana University Bowen Research Center, in collaboration with the Indiana Area Health Education Centers Program recently published its "Report of Responses to the 2003, 2005 and 2007 Indiana Physician Re-licensure Surveys."

The publication provides an in-depth examination of the physician workforce in Indiana. The report provides accurate, timely and relevant data to inform Indiana's response to the health care needs of the Hoosiers.

Co-author Terrell W. Zollinger, DrPH, IU professor of public health notes, "This is the best, most comprehensive information we currently have about the physician workforce in our state. We believe the information will be helpful to a wide range of stakeholders, including policy-makers, educators, business and community leaders, and a wide range of advocacy groups."

The publication includes Indiana physician demographic and employment characteristics, practice location, as well as past and projected physician workforce trends.

Showalter Trust applications due Jan. 11

Since 1975, the Indianapolis campus of IUSM has received research funding through gifts made possible from the Ralph W. and Grace M. Showalter Research Trust Fund. The areas of appropriate biomedical research eligible for funding are broad and described by the benefactors as "the type of medical research that is most likely to permanently benefit mankind."

Applications for funding from the Ralph W. and Grace M. Showalter Research Trust will be reviewed in two stages. An initial review by the IUSM Biomedical Research Committee will select the most meritorious proposals for further discussion and ranking. The BRC will then provide a recommended ranking to the Showalter Trustees who conduct a second review. Final funding decisions are made by the Showalter Trustees.

Applications for funding that begins July 1 must be received via email by the <u>IUSM Office of Operations</u> by 5 p.m. on **Monday, Jan. 11**.

Medical Humanities: History of NIH, research grants

"The Origin of NIH and Medical Research Grants in the U.S." presented by William Schneider, PhD, is the next Seminars in Medical Humanities program. It will be from 4 to 5 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 8 in the VanNuys Medical Science Building, room 311.

Dr. Schneider is a professor of history, the Baker-Ort Professor in International Healthcare Philanthropy and director of the Medical Humanities – Health Studies Program.

The NIH extramural grants (literally "outside the walls" of the NIH campus) are the standard for medical research in the U.S., and indeed the world. In fiscal year 2008 over \$20 billion was awarded to over 46,000 projects. This talk will examine their origins before and after the Second World War.

Wishard releases first construction bid package for new hospital

The Wishard Hospital construction project has released the first construction bid package, which includes a 2,300-car parking garage.

Wishard will construct the six-level parking garage as the first of five buildings at the new site. The parking garage will have three entrances and three stair/elevator towers and will stand on the west side of the new Wishard campus. The garage will accommodate Wishard employees and visitors to the new hospital, as well as provide parking for the Roudebush VA Hospital. Wishard's development also will create an additional 1,500 surface parking spaces upon completion.

The bid package also includes a utility tunnel running under the garage, on- and off-site utilities and rough grading for the new hospital and portions of the site. Off-site utilities will include high-pressure steam and fiber optics along with an underground electric system extension and modification of site drainage.

Bids are due on Jan. 11.

The hospital building project will create more than 4,400 jobs at the height of construction, providing a much-needed shot in the arm to the local building trades industry. In 2010, the garage and demolition work are projected to generate a total of 315 jobs, and in 2011, the garage will create 524 jobs. The garage package and demolition work will provide an estimated economic impact to Marion County of nearly \$28 million in 2010, and more than \$46.5 million in 2011.

"When voters passed the Wishard referendum, they voted not only for a healthier Indianapolis but also for a healthier local economy," said Indianapolis Mayor Gregory A. Ballard. "The construction of this garage will generate hundreds of jobs for local workers, and I congratulate the Wishard team for getting this building project started so quickly."

The garage will stand immediately adjacent to the new hospital to maximize convenience and accessibility for patients, visitors and staff. The garage will eventually connect to the main level of the ambulatory clinic building and the second level of the administrative office building.

Each floor of the garage has a footprint of 240 feet by 609 feet, which is equivalent to the square footage of three football fields. The six levels of the parking structure will provide equivalent square footage of 18 football fields.

On-site work began immediately following the Nov. 3 election, as officials from Wishard and Indiana University signed the land exchange swap the next day, arranging for the transfer of the current Wishard site to Indiana University and the new site to Wishard.

The physical work of the project began immediately as well, with asbestos remediation and interior demolition inside the former Larue D. Carter Hospital. By the end of this year, the interior demolition of the Larue D. Carter Hospital will conclude, and interior demolition and asbestos remediation will begin in the Indiana State Department of Health building. External demolition of Larue D. Carter Hospital starts near the first of the year, and demolition of both buildings wraps up in late spring 2010.

Wishard will break ground on the hospital in spring 2010. Wishard will construct the new hospital in phases, beginning with the parking garage, and plans to complete the project at the end of 2013. To learn more about the construction project, visit <u>www.WishardFacts.org</u>.

Indiana-Kenya Partnership gifts

During this holiday season it is common to take stock of all our blessings and make a wish list of the things we want the most. However, in Kenya there is usually only one wish women make when they arrive at the Moi Teaching and Referral Hospital in Eldoret. That is to live.

One young woman's story is typical of the hardship facing many Kenyans today. She came to the clinic deathly ill requesting only "to live so that I can take care of my children." Her husband had already died of AIDS and she did not want her children to join the thousands of AIDS-related orphans in Africa. It was a mother's plea for hope that regardless of nationality we all can understand.

Through the Indiana-Kenya Partnership this woman's life was saved and so have those of more than 75,000 other mothers, fathers, and children. Recently, the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology contacted one of their colleagues who is permanently stationed in Kenya, Dr. Sierra Washington, and asked her if she had a holiday "wish list" for her patients and learners.

Dr. Washington's clinic needs everything from a light microscope to sutures, scissors, scrub brushes for hand washing and much, much more. To help Dr. Washington, the Department of OB/GYN has set up a special account used to further women's health care. For the next two months, the department is asking members of the IUPUI family to consider making a 100 percent tax deductible donation to one of two accounts.

You can earmark your donation (in the memo portion of your check) for "Kenya Ob/Gyn" to be used to buy equipment/educational material or "Ob/Gyn Humanitarian Fund" to be used by Dr. Washington to purchase such things as medication for patients or pay for transportation from remote villages to the clinic.

All checks should be made payable to "IU Foundation- Kenya Program" and sent to IU Foundation- Kenya Program, PO Box 660245, Indianapolis, IN 46266-0245. You will receive a letter that can be used for tax purposes.

Tune in at 2 p.m. Sunday, Dec. 6, or 8 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 8, to *Sound Medicine*, the award-winning weekly radio program co-produced by IUSM and WFYI Public Radio (90.1FM) in Indianapolis. The program is hosted by Barb Lewis.

This week, *Sound Medicine* producer Colleen Iudice will report a controversy in Indiana where dentists are protesting a proposal to stop adding fluoride to water.
