TRUSTEES APPROVE PERSONNEL, BUDGET, FEE CHANGES

Two deans, a University vice president, a basketball coach, and other assorted personnel changes as well as a new budget, tuition raises and a contract to manage Wishard Memorial Hospital were approved by the I.U. Board of Trustees at its June 17 meeting in Bloomington.

Daly to Head Medical School

Dr. Walter J. Daly, a nationally respected physician, teacher and researcher, has been named the seventh dean of the I.U. School of Medicine and director of the I.U. Medical Center.

The James O. Ritchey Professor of Medicine and I.U. alumnus, Dr. Daly has been chairman of the Department of Medicine, the largest department in the school, since 1970. He succeeds Dr. Steven C. Beering, who is leaving the dean's post July 1 to become president of Purdue University.

Plater Dean of Liberal Arts

The trustees approved the appointment of William M. Plater as dean of the School of Liberal Arts at IUPUI. He comes to Indianapolis from the University of Illinois at Urbana where he has been the associate director of the School of Humanities since 1977. He received his doctorate in English from Illinois in 1973 and has been active both as a teacher of English literature and as a scholar. His background also includes a lengthy list of college and university service activities. He replaces James R. East, who has been serving as the acting dean of the School of Liberal Arts for the past two years.

University Relations Chief Named

Danilo Orescanin, chancellor of I.U. Northwest at Gary, was named vice president for university relations for the entire I.U. System. He will plan and direct communication among faculty members, students and staff as well as supervise and direct information programs to facilitate public understanding of I.U.'s activities and responsibilities. He also will supervise directors of university relations on all I.U. campuses and the I.U. System directors of the news bureau, publications, community relations and special events.

Orescanin has been chancellor at I.U. Northwest Since 1975, although he has had a long and varied association with the University since 1963.

Lovell Appointed Head Basketball Coach

Robert L. Lovell, interim men's basketball coach for the IUPUI Metros last season, was named head basketball coach at the Indianapolis campus. Lovell took command of the IUPUI team last August following the illness and subsequent death of Head Coach Mel Garland. During his year with the Metros, Lovell led the team to a 14-13 record, the second winning season in the school's history. The team also recorded the first post-season victory.

Lovell received his B.A. degree from Franklin College in 1969, majoring in English. He attended Butler University earning a master's degree in 1976, and began his coaching career at Franklin College in 1977. He served as head basketball coach,

assistant athletic director, and assistant professor of physical education until 1981.

Other Personnel Actions

In other major personnel actions affecting the Indianapolis campus, the trustees approved the following appointments: Peter J. Schlinger, professor of history, as director of the Strasbourg Overseas Study Program, International Programs; Michael R. Curtis, from assistant to associate dean for administration, School of Dentistry; John R. Risch, associate professor of complete denture, as acting chairman of the Department of Complete Denture, School of Dentistry; Edgar Fleenor, professor of industrial education, to chairman of the Departments of Construction Technology, Supervision, and Industrial Education, School of Engineering and Technology; H. Oner Yurtseven, associate professor of electrical engineering, from assistant to associate dean, School of Engineering and Technology; W. Kenneth Barger, associate professor of anthropology, from acting assistant dean of grants and administration to chairman of the Department of Anthropology, School of Liberal Arts.

Also E. Theodore Mullen Jr., associate professor of religious studies, to chairman of the Department of Religious Studies, School of Liberal Arts; Frances D. Rhome, professor of English, from University Director of Affirmative Action to Director of the Institute for Humanities Research at IUPUI; Merrill A. Ritter, from clinical professor to professor of orthopedic surgery part-time and appointment as medical director of the International Institute of Sports Science and Medicine; Richard L. Schreiner, professor of pediatrics, to the Edwin L. Gresham Professor of Pediatrics; Patricia A. Boaz, associate professor of chemistry, from assistant to associate dean, School of Science.

Students, Faculty, Computers, Emphasized

Increased funding for student aid, faculty and computers received emphasis in the 1983-84 budget approved by the trustees. The full operating budget for the eight campuses totals \$758 million.

Total personnel compensation, up about 3.5 percent, was primarily devoted to continuing faculty positions with increases provided on a merit basis. Other increased expenditures included student aid and academic and administrative computer equipment reflecting I.U.'s stepped-up computer instructional programs along with such new administrative procedures as computerized registration. An increase in student instructional fees for 1983-84, also approved, is expected to generate \$6.6 million in new income.

In Indianapolis, undergraduates will pay \$43.25 an hour, a 7.5 per cent raise, while graduate students will pay \$61.50, a 7 percent hike. Bloomington graduate students will pay the same fees as those in Indianapolis. Law and optometry fees on both campuses will be \$61.50 for Hoosiers and \$168 for non-residents. In-state dentistry students in Indianapolis will pay \$3000 a year, up 7.1 percent, while those from other states will pay \$6,400. Resident medical students will pay \$3,200 a year, up 6.7 percent, while out-of-state residents will pay \$7,700.

Wishard Management Contract Passed

The management contract for Wishard Hospital was passed with only a few minutes of public discussion. Trustees Harry Gonzo and Clarence Long sought reassurance that Wishard will not be a huge debt for the university to bear. The Marion County Health and Hospital Corporation promises in the pact to do everything possible to channel enough property tax money to I.U. to cover the huge cost of caring for indigent persons.

The University has had a contract for medical operation of the county-owned facility since 1975 and is credited with making many improvements. The new agreement,

effective July 1 and good for 10 years, adds authority and responsibility for the business, financial and personnel affairs of Wishard, including the county's legal responsibility to give free medical care to indigent patients. About \$25 million of Wishard's \$81 million budget this year is for caring for indigent patients.

DEAN BEERING HONORED BY V.A. MEDICAL CENTER

Dr. Steven C. Beering, retiring dean of the I.U. School of Medicine, recently was honored by the Richard L. Roudebush V.A. Medical Center for his "outstanding leadership and enthusiastic support of the V.A. Affiliated Program and medical education."

Dean Beering received a Commendation from V.A. Administrator Harry Walters and Chief Medical Director Dr. Donald L. Custis which was presented by Great Lakes V.A. Regional Director A. L. Zamberlan. In congratulating Dr. Beering on his appointment as president of Purdue University, Dr. Custis wrote "during your tenure as dean and chairman of the Deans Committee, our affiliation with the I.U. School of Medicine has matured and flourished. This collaborative effort has been largely responsible for enhancing our capacity to ensure the continuous availability of the highest quality of medical care to eligible veterans while building a sound educational environment in our two institutions."

Barbara McQueen, assistant bursar for student organizations, has been appointed to the board of directors of the Friends of Channel 20 to serve until 1986.

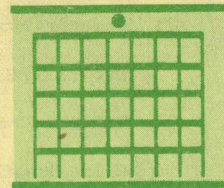
